# Laird Schaub to Lead Feb. 23 Workshop on 'Conflict'

On Feb. 23, Laird Schaub will conduct a workshop, "Conflict: Flight, Fight or *Opportunity*?" Laird will share the regular Sunday Service with Rev. Molly and then continue the workshop following a light lunch after the coffee hour. The workshop will conclude by 4 p.m.

In addition to being an author and public speaker about various aspects of community, Laird is also a meeting junkie and has parlayed his passion for good process into a consulting business on group dynamics. He has worked with about 100 different cooperative groups, many of them multiple times.

His specialty is up-tempo meetings that engage the full range of human input, teaching groups to work creatively with conflict, and at the same time being ruthless about capturing as much product as possible. In 2003, he pioneered a two-year training in Integrative Facilitation that he has delivered eight times and is now marketing across the continent.

Laird has lived 39 years at Sandhill Farm, an incomesharing community in Missouri which he helped found. He is also the main administrator of the Fellowship for International Community, a network organization he helped create in 1987 that serves as a clearing house of



information about North American communities of all stripes.

Sponsored by the Peace Building Team, "Conflict: Flight, Fight, or *Opportunity*?" will be an excellent chance for us to better understand and engage each other in moments of reaction and disagreement. We hope you'll join us for an illuminating day of skill building and connection.

#### Something new for OWL

### OWL Camp planned during spring break

OWL (Our Whole Lives) covers relationships, sexuality and sexual expression for teens. The interactive course covers important topics such as communication in a relationship, how to break up, staying safe, gender identity, sexual orientation, pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases and tough issues such as abortion and rape.

We are trying something new. OWL Camp will be offered in March 2014 for students in 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> grade. We are taking OWL on the road to Camp Shannondale in Salem, Missouri. We will have heated space for sleeping and learning as well as beautiful grounds for letting off some energy.

We will hold a parent meeting from 6 to 9 p.m. March 9 at the church. Parents/guardians must participate in orientation meeting in order for youth to attend. Youth will meet at the church for an initial class from 2 to 6 p.m. March 16. We'll head to Camp Shannondale during spring break, leaving Wednesday, March 26 and returning Sunday, March 30. We'll have one final meeting to wrap up from 2 to 6 p.m. April 6.

Class size is limited to 20 students. First priority for enrollment is given to children of members and friends of the UU churches in Columbia and Jefferson City. We round out our classes with youth from United Church of Christ and then other community members when space permits.

The OWL base curriculum was cowritten by the Unitarian Universalist Association and the United Church of Christ. Our teaching team continually updates the curriculum with current materials and topics relevant to our youth. We use popular media, current research, and news articles. Information about contraception and safe sex is updated with assistance from the Boone County Health Department.

OWL is typically taught between January and March. Junior High OWL is offered in odd-numbered years to students in 7<sup>th</sup>-9<sup>th</sup> grade. The next Junior High OWL class will be offered in January 2015. High School OWL is offered in even-numbered years.

A new ministry team, the "Two Services Research Team," consisting of Fran Reynolds, Tracey Milarsky, Kevin Fritsche, and myself, has been established. Our charge is to gather information regarding the desirability and feasibility of adding a second worship service.

Have you noticed that on nearly every Sunday morning our facilities including the Sanctuary, religious education classrooms, and parking lot are full or almost full? Well, it is true, and it is a great testament to the work we are doing. However, studies show that when churches feel crowded (>80% capacity), newcomers feel less welcome. The addition of another service would not only call us to extend our radical welcome to others in mid-Missouri, but with some creativity, a second service could appeal to people our current service/ programming does not reach. not only successfully introduced a second service, but also a third service that takes place on Saturday afternoons. Our neighbors in St. Louis at Emerson and First Church, as well as many other UU congregations across the country, have also benefitted from having more than one worship opportunity each week.

In order to make this extension of our radical welcome a reality, we need your input and support. In the next few months we will be gathering and sharing information with you about how and when other UU congregations have successfully made this transition. There will be many opportunities for you to share your thoughts and concerns with us. Consider this just a "heads up." We look forward to your participation and support in this important process.
