On Sacrifice by Moshe Halbertal – A philosophical exploration of sacrifice as a force in religion, politics, and ethics. Halbertal, a Jewish philosopher, particularly explores the complex role of sacrifice as both a noble and destructive ideal.

Saving Paradise: How Christianity Traded Love of This World for Crucifixion and Empire by Rebecca Parker & Rita Nakashima Brock – A theological work questioning the glorification of torture and suffering present in the story of crucifixion. This work will be the touchstone for our Easter sermon.

Overwhelmed: Work, Love, and Play When No One Has the Time by Brigid Schulte – An examination of the stress that comes from the quest to do and have it all, and an exploration of what we might need to sacrifice in order to ultimately live more fulfilling lives.

President's Perspective

Strategic planning will follow adoption of 'Ends Statements'

In February the Board of Trustees took another major step toward implementing policy governance by adopting "Ends Statements" (see accompanying article by Maria Oropallo).

The Ends Statements follow up on the congregation's Mission Statement, which captures our basic purpose, and the Vision Statement, which details the congregation's priorities over the next several years.

Now the board is getting ready to embark on the next step – formulating and adopting a strategic plan.

A strategic plan indicates the major means by which the congregation will fulfill its mission over a five- to ten-year span of time. It includes plans for program and membership development, staffing, and capital-development steps, like building programs and endowment funds.

Many alternative strategies could be faithful to the mission; through a process of strategic planning, the congregation, acting through the board, chooses one set of strategies it plans to stick with.

A strategic plan can take up to a year to create and may run several or many pages. Issues that should be considered for inclusion are program development, membership development, a capital plan, and a staffing plan.

When the strategic plan is in place, it will provide direction for the congregation, the board and the staff by setting out detailed program ideas, timelines, budgets, and specific staffing changes.

'Ends Statements' adopted by board

"Ends Statements" are a way to prescribe rigorous expectations for the organizational performance that the congregation (through the Board) wants to see. They are a way to describe the reasons UUCC exists. The ends are dynamic and should be used as guides by the board to evaluate and monitor our progress as a church.

In February 2014, the Board of Trustees adopted the following Ends Statements, prefaced by the <u>Mission and Vision Statements</u> adopted by the congregation last May:

- 1. UUCC is a warm and rich community. We live our radical welcome by inviting all who hunger for deeper connection into a mutual journey of growth and transformation.
- 2. UUCC embodies courageous love by challenging ourselves and working with others to be the change we want to see. Together we move outside our comfort zones as we work for justice and to help heal the world.
- 3. The members and friends of UUCC join with other congregations and groups in Columbia to work passionately for social change. In particular, we lead in the struggle for LGBTQ rights, distributive justice, and environmental sustainability.
- 4. Our members and friends of all ages, abilities, beliefs, and life experiences are seriously engaged with a lively process of faith formation, and their lives are marked by increased wholeness, inspiration, hope, and courage.
- 5. UUCC nourishes a spirit of curiosity, and open, reasoned, and critical inquiry.

An excellent description of why it is important to write good Ends Statements can be found in this <u>detailed discussion</u> on the UUA Governance page.

The board will form a task force including members of the congregation to develop the strategic plan. Meetings of the task force will be open, and we invite members and friends to attend and make their views known.

At the same time the task force and board are working on the strategic plan, the board also will be taking the last major step in implementing policy governance - formulation of a detailed oversight policy to fulfill the board's duty to ensure that the congregation's human and material resources are used for the benefit of its mission. The oversight policy will establish a plan for monitoring and evaluating that work so staff and lay program leaders are accountable, and so that the congregation learns from its experience. Input on oversight will be welcomed.


