# Truth

As Unitarian Universalists, we affirm and promote...

A free and responsible search for truth and meaning.

– Fourth Principle of the Unitarian Universalist Association

Where do we look when we search for truth? Does truth exist outside us somewhere, in the material world? Does it exist within, amid our own experience and perception of reality? Or does it emerge somewhere between, where inner meets outer?

As Unitarian Universalists, we are committed to searching for truth, but words become slippery the moment we seek to define what truth itself might be. Perhaps it is only the search itself we can count on, as the ground of truth shifts and moves beneath us.

This month in worship, we will explore the many aspects of a search for truth – philosophical concepts of Truth and truths; contemporary scientific understandings of how we perceive reality; psychological hypotheses about why we lie to ourselves and others; and theological musings on the great mystery of the known and the unknown.

## Highlights of What's Inside

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Our 2015 Stewardship Campaign got off to a good start on Sunday, Feb. 15, with pledges from 30 pledgers totaling \$68,540 by the end of the day – and after worship on Feb. 22, we had 57 pledges totaling \$109,385. Many thanks to our early pledgers!

We've got a long way to go, however, to meet our goal of pledges from all 170 potential pledgers and our target of \$260,000.

Dennis Murphy's lovely campaign banner in the Greeting Area, shown above, perfectly captures our theme of "All Together Now" – we are all in the same boat, all stewards of this beloved church, and all responsible for its well-being, preservation and forward movement.

The Stewardship Team is very serious about this year's goal of 100% pledging. For the current fiscal year, one in five of our potential pledgers did not pledge, limiting our ability to budget effectively and plan ahead for the growth we're experiencing.

So we ask those of you who haven't pledged before but routinely put money in the offering basket to pledge at least the amount you would put in the basket over a year's time. **All pledges make a difference!** 

And we're asking those of you who routinely pledge to consider increasing your pledges.

We calculate that if overall pledging by current pledgers increases by about 20%, and if we achieve 100% pledging, we will see an overall increase of about \$50,000, which would meet our need of \$260,000 for 2015-16.



# Stewardship 2015 "All Together Now"


# Where Does Your Pledge Money Go?

### Program Budget Notes

include: Ministries Social Action Team and activities: small groups; church service groups; adult religious education; Young Adult Group; OWL; public related relations/website; and costs for staff, facilities and administration.

Worship includes: Worship services; music program; and related costs for staff, facilities and administration.

**Religious Education includes:** Children's R.E. program related costs for staff, facilities and administration.

## 2015-16 Needs

- With the impending retirement of Lisa Fritsche as Director of Religious Education, we are seeking to make the DRE position nearly full-time from September through May and part-time from June through August. This alone will increase our pledging need by about \$9,000.
- Other staff and administrative expenses are projected to increase by about 5%.
- We have drawn on now almost depleted reserve funds the past two years to meet pledging shortfalls, and we need to rebuild a reserve to cover unanticipated expenses.

Based on these projections, we estimate we need total pledges of \$260,000 for 2015-16, a \$50,000 increase over current pledges.

## Considering your pledge amount

The amount you pledge is your personal decision based on your financial resources and needs. Please consider the following information when deciding on your pledge:

### Current Fiscal Year Pledges

	No. of Pledges	Pledge Range
Top 25% of total pledged	10	\$4,100 to \$9,000
Next 25% of total pledged	16	\$2,030 to \$4,000
Next 25% of total pledged	30	\$1,380 to \$2,004
Next 25% of total pledged	73	\$40 to \$1,320

The current pledge distribution is very bottom-heavy, which can cause serious shortfalls when people in the top 50% of the total amount pledged reduce their pledges or no longer pledge for some reason. Thus, the Stewardship Team urges pledgers to move into a higher pledge range if they are able.

All pledges make a difference! A pledge of only \$1 per day (\$365/ year) from the 20% of potential pledgers who have not pledged before, together with a 20% increase in pledges from current pledgers, would meet our 2015-16 needs.

## Introducing your DRE Search Team

As we prepare for the summer retirement of Lisa Fritsche, our beloved Director of Religious Education (DRE), we have been working hard on transition planning. Your R.E. Team and I have spent the fall gathering input and doing our own discernment regarding the future of our program. Here are some of the priorities that have emerged:

- Expand the DRE position as much as is possible at this time from 25 hours/week 10 months of the year to 35 hours/week from September to May and 10 hours/week from June to August.
- Add to the position oversight and support for our high school age youth program and seek a candidate who enjoys working with teens and understands our philosophy of youth leadership development and youth-led curricula.
- Emphasize our growing focus on multi-generational community building, including multi-generational worship, multi-generational fellowship, and support to families raising UU kids.
- Emphasize our mission of radical welcome and our desire to become increasingly accessible to individuals of all ages, abilities, learning needs, and experiences. Seek a candidate conversant in varying curricula and pedagogies to this end.

We have now gathered a Search Team that will partner with me in a search process for our new Director of Religious Education. We will be advertising the position nationally and regionally, and we are also very open to local candidates. By March 1, we plan to have the position posted and to be accepting applicants.

# Second Annual Trivia Night to Benefit Honduras Work a Great Success

The evening included a chili contest, a silent auction, fair trade sewing cooperative items for sale, and a bar. The winning table won tickets to the Ragtag Cinema donated by Tracy Lane. Joelle Quoirin, the chili contest winner, won an apron.

The trivia night raised \$3,600! Most of this money and the money raised through the Faith-to-Action collection in October will be contributed to the health clinic in El Pital, the microfinance organization Adelante and the Juan Pablo Segundo Fair Trade Sewing Cooperative and Community Center. Also, the church general fund will receive \$500.

More details are to come in the April newsletter on how the money is being spent and on plans for the next Honduras trip. The group will keep you posted!



# Columbia CROP Hunger Walk named Columbia Values Diversity Award Winner

The Columbia CROP Hunger Walk and 5K Run was honored as the 2015 Columbia Values Diversity Award Winner - Group Division at the annual Columbia Diversity Celebration on Thursday, Jan. 15.

Our CROP Hunger WALK and 5K Run includes people from faith traditions across our community – Christian, Hindu, Muslim, Jewish, Baha'i and others. We may walk in different circles throughout the year, but we come together at the WALK/5K Run to raise funds to fight hunger and help meet the needs of people here at home and around the world.

Local and online donations from our September WALK & 5K Run totaled \$14,062.05.

Local funds (25% of the total, or \$3,515.00) are now being put to work through:

- Loaves & Fishes Soup Kitchen
- Russell Chapel CME Community Food Pantry
- The Latter House Kingdom Ministries Food Pantry
- Fifth Street Christian Church's Feed the Community program

Global funds (75% of the total) help support the ecumenical ministry of Church World Service which works with partners around the world – including the United States – to eradicate hunger and poverty by providing sustainable self-help and development, disaster relief, and refugee assistance. Our world needs compassionate care and development more than ever.
