### Exploring an additional worship service

Noon Sunday, April 12 • 10 a.m. Saturday, April 25

Have you noticed that the sanctuary often feels crowded on Sunday morning? Have you had trouble finding a place to park? Have you stood in the back of the room searching for a desirable seat?

And yet, do you long for there to be a place among us for all who seek our message and beloved community?

Folks who study church growth and dynamics tell us that when 80% of desirable seats are occupied on Sunday mornings, it is time to add another service or experience stagnation and declining attendance. ("Desirable" means the front row and the seats behind the columns don't count!)

We have calculated that in our sanctuary, 80% of desirable seats is 104. Our average worship attendance in February was 126, well over the 80% threshold that

experts recommend as maximum

We've seen similar numbers for quite some time now – and yet we've discerned a desire to continue growing and including new folks in our mission and community. So it seems that if we are to make room for those who seek our message, it is time to add an additional worship service...

And we want your input! What are you looking for in a worship experience? What are your fears about adding a service? What are your hopes? Who isn't among us yet, and how can we make space for them?

Join us at **noon Sunday, April 12**, or at **10 a.m. Saturday, April 25**, in the sanctuary to discuss these questions and more as we discern how to manage and continue the growth of our beloved community.

### Forum schedule for April 2015

#### 9 a.m. Sundays

The UU Forum, an adult discussion group open to the public, meets on Sundays from 9 to 10 a.m. Conversation and light refreshments are offered along with the discussion. #### Sunday, April 5

"When a Cop Pulls the Trigger." In a reaction to the recent shootings of unarmed black men, Dr. Wayne Anderson, author of *Stress Management for Law Enforcement Officers*, will discuss the larger context in which shootings occur and officers' reactions to them based on his work as a police consultant with the Missouri State Highway Patrol and local law enforcement agencies.

#### Sunday, April 12

Dr. Zakiya Adair, Assistant Professor of Women's and Gender Studies, will present "Black Women Vaudeville Performers and Trans-Atlantic Theatre 1915-1940." She will trace how talented black women such as Florence Mills and Josephine Baker broke free of the limitations placed on them by American theaters and made successful careers in France and England. (Dr. Adair is the 2013 Recipient of the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) Scholar in Residence at Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture, New York City)

#### Sunday, April 19

Drs. Carla and Wayne Anderson will present on "The American Civil Rights Movement as seen in Southern museums." Based on their travels through the South as reported in their Venture Bound column in *The Columbia Daily Tribune*, they will focus on such places as Little Rock Seven, Rosa Parks Museum, and Birmingham's Kelly Ingram Park where water hoses and vicious dogs were used against protestors.

#### Sunday, April 26

Dr. Wayne Anderson will present on "The New Jim Crow," a discussion of how the criminal justice system has been used to disenfranchise black males by the use of drug enforcement laws with unreasonable stop and search, three strikes means a life sentence, and mere possession of drugs can mean a felony conviction. In the last thirty years we have gone from 300,000 imprisoned to 2,300,000 the largest prison system in the world. The lack of rehabilitation, the lack of voting rights, and the difficulty of finding work keep black males unable to realize their potential. Dr. Anderson has worked with prisoners in the Jefferson City Maximum Security Prison to help develop their rehabilitation program for drug and alcohol abusers.

### Green Sanctuary Team news



The Green Sanctuary Team is committed to the issue of growing, consuming, and thinking about food in an ethical way. Several GS Team members and other UUCC members participated in the Columbia Center for Urban Agriculture workday held at Lucky's on Saturday, March 14. An urban "milk crate" garden is in progress on the southeast corner of Lucky's. What an awesome idea – check it out!

Thanks to Janice Smith for hosting another "bagmaking" evening March 17. T-shirts donated by church members were cut and sewn into approximately 40 reusable cloth bags. The bags can be used to bring your dishes, utensils, and cups to potluck Sundays. We still need more T-shirts (not fabric), and will soon decide on a distribution plan.

The GS Team is encouraging the church to use environmentally friendly soaps, cleaners, tissues and other products. A rough draft of a new purchasing policy is in the works. Please contact Lisa Guillory with suggestions and ideas for this transition to products that are less toxic

to all living beings.

Earth Day is Sunday, April 19. The GS Team will sponsor a table to promote UUCC's values, programs and activities. Soon UUCC members and friends will receive an email link for SignUpGenius. 








### What? No Third Sunday Lunch in April?


