Sunday, June 5 "Self-Compassion in the Digital Age" Rev. Molly Housh Gordon

Nurturing Spirit and Service

Each year in June, several thousand Unitarian Universalists from across the country gather to worship and learn together and to do the business of the Unitarian Universalist Association. It is always an inspiring time (Mark your calendars now: General Assembly in June 2018 will be in Kansas City!)

This year's gathering is in Columbus, Ohio with the theme "Heart Land: Where Faiths Connect." The planners describe the theme as follows: "The faith world is increasingly multifaith. People are crossing borders of religion and spiritual practice to create wholeness in their lives individually and collectively. The labels – Christian, Jew, Muslim, Buddhist, Hindu, theist and non-theist – no longer define who or what we love, or how spirit moves in our lives." [uua.org/ga] And the plans of the assembly include conversations and joint work with people of other faith traditions in the heartland area.

This month, as Unitarian Universalists from across the country consider what it means to live in an increasingly multi-faith world, perhaps we at home might consider the same question. How can we engage with the fullness of a multi-faith world? Do we truly recognize and celebrate that which unites us and the real differences of culture? What spiritual work helps us experience difference as a source of spiritual richness rather than a source of fear and division?

Just a few things to ponder, knowing that as you do, so do Unitarian Universalists of many backgrounds and experiences across this beloved tradition.

Highlights of what's inside

Green Sanctuary



The Green Sanctuary Team is the sponsor of "Down by the Riverside" June 11-12. Details are on page 4 of this issue of *The Searchlight*.

Summer religious education classes will emphasize our Seventh Principle. Green Sanctuary Team members will be teaching three Sundays this summer during July and/or August. Suggested topics are bees and other pollinators, changing weather, and our connections to food and its production. Suggestions for other topics are welcome.

On Saturday, April 23, Green Sanctuary and RE partnered in our first-ever "BioBlitz." A BioBlitz is a short-term exploration of one place to find and list every species that lives there. During our one-hour BioBlitz, we explored the church grounds with seven children and their parents. We found spring wild flowers, thorny trees, berry bushes, insects, spiders and birds. We also learned how to recognize poison ivy so we can protect ourselves in the woods, and we learned about invasive plants like bush honeysuckle so we can help protect the woods!

Bergfried Campground near Hermann is reserved Oct. 14-15 for a UUCC family camping weekend. Peter Holmes and Patty Daus are planning this event and welcome others as part of a planning team for activities both spiritual and physical. Save the dates on your calendar – the weather is fantastic that time of year, and leaves will just be starting to change color.

Last month the Earth Day Festival gave GS Team the opportunity to discuss our Seven Principles with festival goers. Several people expressed interest in attending our church, and we enjoyed discussing how our UUCC values support environmental concerns.

Green Tip of the Month: Pump liquid soap containers cause plastic waste, and many typical soaps contain harmful dyes and fragrances made from petroleum products. In addition antibacterial soaps in the home increase antibiotic resistant microbes, and children should not be frequently exposed to tricolosan. At home consider replacing liquid soap plastic pumps with plant-based bar soaps – better for our families and better for the environment.

President's Perspective

And the Show Goes On

One of the themes in the Oscar-winning 1998 movie "Shakespeare in Love" (at least for me) is how wonderful things can happen amidst chaos and uncertainty. The movie, in which a fictionalized William Shakespeare navigates romance, shows how in many theatrical productions, everything seems to be going wrong up until the very last moment. And then, almost miraculously, the show goes on.

I thought about this theme before and after our Annual Congregational Meeting, which convened after worship Sunday, May 15. I will confess I felt extremely ill-prepared. As president, I was in charge of chairing the meeting.

In my view, a chairperson for an official meeting has two very important responsibilities:

- 1. Strive to ensure everyone understands what is going on.
 - 2. Strive to ensure everyone is heard.

These are lofty goals, and not achieved 100 percent of the time, but they are my priorities.

Despite my initial jitters, the other executive team members and church leaders were on the ball. Secretary Steve Scott provided mentorship and ensured small details were addressed. Treasurer Gregg Suhler compiled the lion's share of the handouts and expertly fielded many of the complex questions about our church budget. Rev. Molly Housh Gordon assisted in facilitating a healthy discussion during the meeting. Church Administrator Kathie Bergman helped field some of the more nuanced budget questions. And others worked behind the scenes to ensure a productive meeting.

I remain in awe and gratitude for all of these efforts and those left unmentioned (but not unnoticed).

In the end, the members passed a budget for the next year and elected four new board members. Despite the chaos*, the show goes on.




