I'm writing this column at a very sad time. It's been less than 24 hours since the mass shooting at an Orlando gay nightclub. Tracey and I are from Florida – we know the area well and have many friends in that state.

I don't really have the words to convey the utter sadness and frustration from this event.

I am, for what it's worth, very grateful to have the community we all share here at UUCC. I am grateful for the imperfect connections we enjoy on social media platforms, and being able to read the words of my friends and minister in that way.

For me, tragedies highlight the importance of community – and the importance of continuing support of that community in good and bad times.

While it feels a little strange to transition to housekeeping items in the wake of those thoughts, it's also part of my job. So I'll take this opportunity to announce a few Board of Trustees news items:

The board voted unanimously in May to reappoint me as church president for the 2016-2017 church year. This was not an easy decision. Ideally, the church presidency should change hands annually. Unfortunately, it was not possible to choose someone who was both willing to serve and had not served before. We expect to have a new president in the 2017-2018 church year. Meanwhile, I am grateful to my fellow board members for their trust.

1 fluoride toothpaste, 6 oz or more,
2 adult sealed soft toothbrushes,
4 child size sealed soft toothbrushes and
