#### Sept. 4

Wayne Anderson will present on "Women's Equality: Why Is It Taking So Long?" With occasional sharp gains, women have made mostly slow progress in in escaping from the box of social norms that viewed them as being limited human beings incapable of handling complicated jobs and their own finances. He will place emphasis on the great changes that took place in the late 1960s and early 1970s as some of the walls limiting them fell down and what is happening now.

#### Sept. 11

Wayne Anderson will present on the book *The Oregon Trail: A New American Journey*. Rinker Buck not only gives a firsthand account of what it was like for him and his brother Nick in 2014 to drive a covered wagon pulled by a mule team across the 2,000-mile Oregon Trail but also introduces us to the problems faced by the 400,000 settlers, ranchers and entrepreneurs who made the journey between 1846 and 1869.

## Sept. 18

Yolanda Ciolli, publisher of AKA Publishing and Compass Flower Press, offers independent book publishing services to authors who want to see their work in print. She will discuss exciting news regarding self-publishing and the greater acceptance self-publishers' books are getting from book stores. Wayne Anderson, a travel writer for *The Columbia Daily Tribune* who has visited 60 of the world's top 100 wonders, will discuss his latest book, *Unforgettable World Wonders*, in which he recounts his visits to 45 of those wonders in 14 countries. ## UU Life Writers start on Oct. 1


UU Life Writers – the group that writes great stories! We start this fall on Saturday, Oct. 1 at the usual 10:30 a.m. time.

# **CROP Hunger Walk on Sept. 25**

This year's CROP Walk to alleviate hunger here in Columbia and around the world will take place on Sept. 25, starting at 2 p.m. at the Gordon Shelter at Stephens Lake Park.

The funds raised will benefit Church World Service (CWS) and five local partners: Loaves and Fishes Soup Kitchen, Russell Chapel Food Pantry, Latter House Food Pantry, Fifth Street Christian Church's Feed the Community program, and – new in 2016 – the Columbia Center for Urban Agriculture.

CWS works with partner organizations around the world. For instance, Melecio Cantoral Gonzalez in Honduras learned new farming techniques to diversify his crops. This helped him survive and even thrive in spite of changing weather patterns. He has passed his new knowledge on to his fellow villagers, and he is now in the position to help family and friends.

#### Second report from 2016 UU General Assembly

# Congregational Study Action Issues (CSAI) and Actions of Immediate Witness (AIW)

A large chunk of the business meetings at the 2016 GA was taken up making decisions about which CSAI to adopt and which AIW's to support. Amie Burling and I voted as delegates representing UUCC on these proposals. Four CSAI's were proposed, and we had to select one issue for study and action within our congregations as part of the larger denominational movement for the next four years. The proposed CSAI's were:

- 1. Climate Change and Environmental Justice
- 2. A National Conversation on Race
- 3. Ending Gun Violence in America
- 4. The Corruption of our Democracy

The CSAI that got the most votes was number 4, the corruption of our democracy. As corporations use "corporate personhood" and "money as speech" for their interests rather than people's needs, can a constitutional amendment be passed to protect us? Could this further UU work for social and environmental justice and help protect the health and safety of the people and planet?

Three AIW's were proposed and adopted by delegates:

- 1. Build Solidarity with our Muslims Neighbors
- 2. Some Guns, All Guns: Legislating Appropriate Restrictions
- 3. Stop The Hate: Protect and Support our Transgender and Gender Non-Conforming Family

The AIW process allows Unitarian Universalists to respond quickly to social issues deemed urgent. Adopted AIWs are used by congregations in local efforts to take action and recommend action through other departments of the UUA and other Unitarian Universalist groups.

I found myself thinking about all the many social issues our congregation is trying to address. Our energy often seems to be spread very thin and consequently we do not make much progress in any one particular area. What if we decided to adopt just one particular issue each year, put our own favorite cause aside, and all work together to really create change? Could we not be more effective in our actions by doing this?




