Spiritual Growth is cultivated by practicing . . .

A capacity to be in the presence of pain without panic

When I was a kid, there was a certain slope in the road in my neighborhood that my brother and I loved cruising down on our rollerblades. Our favorite thing was to experiment with different ways to become more aerodynamic and increase our speed. Inevitably, one day I hit top speed and flew down that slope, only to wipe out at the bottom. I skinned every uncovered bit of flesh, and a few covered bits too, where the friction of pavement to cloth tore open my jeans at the knees.

What I will always remember most about that moment is the look of worry and fear on my dad's face as he rushed from the house to my side, yelling at me the whole way. Why didn't I use my brakes? How did I get going so fast? Was I ok? I knew even then that his yelling wasn't from anger but from terror for my wellbeing. His reaction was a measure of his deep love for me. I knew he would take my pain from me, if he could.

But he and I also knew that the pain was mine to endure, as I limped inside and wincingly cleaned my scrapes. He sat beside me and helped with the peroxide, the ointment, the bandages. He couldn't take away the pain, but his loving presence was all I needed in order to endure.

We know that pain is inevitable in this life, whether pain of body, mind, or spirit. And sometimes our appropriate reaction to pain is to rage against our suffering and that of our loved ones. But when the raging is done, healing may come most truly from the unrelenting presence to the fullness of our experience. This presence doesn't try to fix us, but sees our wholeness and agency even amid our pain. This presence requires grappling with the fear and worry that are the companions of love. This presence requires turning toward the reality of suffering, and peering unwaveringly through to the dignity within. Join us this month as we seek to grow in presence, compassion, and love.

Wayne Anderson, human sexuality instructor for 40 years, will present, "How Helen Gurley Brown Changed Women's Attitudes Toward Their Own Sexuality." Brown not only wrote the influential book *Sex and the Single Girl* but also turned *Cosmopolitan* magazine into a major influence in young women's lives in the 1970s and 80s.

Green Sanctuary Team Updates

Certification effort involves partnership with MRCC

Your Green Sanctuary Team is working hard toward achieving official certification from the UUA. As part of that effort, we are working in partnership with the Missouri Rural Crisis Center (MRCC) to help rural Missourians protect their water supplies and their home environments from the devastation that comes with confined animal feeding operations (CAFOs), or what you may think of as industrial livestock production.

The only way to limit CAFOs in Missouri is for counties to pass health ordinances that create stricter regulations than the state requires. So far, this has resulted in Missouri having about 500 CAFOs, versus Iowa, with 11,000. This is termed "local control," and only works in this direction. Counties cannot weaken state rules.

Corporate agriculture interests would like to eliminate the local control option in Missouri. They have been beaten back by MRCC for years now, but it is a constant threat. Watch for GST members with information about this issue and a petition that you can sign in coming weeks!

Why plant natives? Native plant species have co-evolved with native insect species and provide important food resources for thousands of species of invertebrates, as

well as for birds and other animals.

The recipients of Faith-to-Action Collections were nominated by the SAT team and voted on by the congregation. The April Faith-to-Action collection will be for the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC), an international organization that advances human rights through grassroots collaboration. In more than a dozen countries throughout the world, UUSC fosters economic and environmental justice and protects human rights at risk in order to create a world free from oppression.
