The perception of universal connectedness

"Tug on anything at all, and you'll find it connected to everything else in the universe."

– John Muir

Did you know that quantum physics supports our UU seventh principle – respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part?

Process theologian Catherine Keller writes of the theological implications of the emerging quantum physics that show our universe to be entangled and web-like from the quantum level up, particles vibrating together and, once connected, indistinguishable from one another even across vast distances.

This emerging physics of quantum entanglement supports the worldview held by process philosophers – of the universe as dynamic and relational at every level, what Keller calls a "participatory universe."

In this participatory universe, our actions, decisions, and even our subjective experiences are so deeply woven together that the act of any one individual has a profound impact on all others and the whole unfolding universe itself, just as the unfolding of the whole universe finds its expression in each of us.

Indeed, our entanglement stretches every which way. As individuals, we are caught up in larger systems and in the universe itself, but so are those systems and the universe deeply impacted by the actions and decisions of each individual.

When we tug on that web of existence, we find our motions rippling out and in and back around again. It is truly a living, moving, mysterious web we weave.

Join us this month to live with humility, creativity, and awe into the reality of our interconnection.

Green Sanctuary Team Updates

The centerpiece of the Green Sanctuary certification process is our environmental justice project. We will be teaming up with the Missouri Rural Crisis Center, formed in the 1980s to save Missouri family farms from industrializing and consolidating agriculture and the policies that promote those forces.

They are working to keep small family farms in business, in contrast to Confined Animal Feeding Operations (CAFOs), which can allow up to 17,499 hogs within 2,000 feet of a neighbor's home and unlimited numbers of animals within 100 feet of a stream. A Class 1A CAFO (17,500 hogs) can generate as much waste as the city of St. Louis! This volume of manure is *not* beneficial to the neighborhood! Air emissions from ponds and from spraying can cause nausea, headaches, vomiting, diarrhea and pulmonary edema, and pollute the water for the entire community.

Communities in Missouri's Class 3 (agricultural) counties have only one way to protect themselves – county health ordinances. This technique has kept CAFO numbers in Missouri around 500, while our neighbor to the north, Iowa, has 11,000! Twenty Mis-

souri counties so far have passed health ordinances, but every year since 2003, our legislature has tried to push through bills making it more difficult for counties to have a say in their own health and environmental regulations.

We are working with MRCC to raise awareness of this issue and to continue to fight for our rural communities and small family farmers who want to protect Missouri's water quality. This issue is termed "Local Control," and allows counties to vote for restrictions on pollution. It does not allow them to

have less stringent regulations than the state.

Does Your Family Like to Hike?



We are starting a new monthly event at UUCC, a hike for all ages. The purpose of the hikes is to strengthen our connection to nature while also strengthening our connection to each other and building our community.

We will have two different hikes scheduled each month, to accommodate our different

schedules and needs. One hike will take place on the third Sunday of the month (for May, that will be **May 21**). We will meet at the church at 1:45 p.m. and then head over to Grindstone Nature Area (on Old Hwy. 63) at 2 p.m. We will hike the same trail each month, learning to become attuned to the changes and cycles that are occurring. The hike is approximately two miles in length, with a creek at which we will stop for a while to rest and play at the halfway point. Most of the hike is fairly moderate, but there is one 50-meter stretch that is fairly steep.

The second hike will take place on the fourth Monday of the month (**May 22**), meeting at the church at 9:45 a.m. and leaving for Grindstone Nature Area at 10 a.m. The hike is approximately 0.5 miles, with two stops for creek play. The hike is fairly moderate, with a few small hills. There is a very shallow creek that we will cross, so wearing shoes that can get wet is advisable.
