# <u>Resilient Community Weaves In</u> . . . **Flexibility**

"Water is fluid, soft, and yielding. But water will wear away rock, which is rigid and cannot yield. As a rule, whatever is fluid, soft, and yielding will overcome whatever is rigid and hard. This is another paradox: what is soft is strong."

– Lao Tzu

About a year ago, I started studying Pilates, a form of exercise particularly focused on balancing between flexibility and strength. The teacher is always reminding the class to soften when we are tempted to power through, and sure enough, the work deepens. Flexibility is shallow without strength, she reminds us, and strength is brittle without flexibility. This is a challenging paradox in exercise, and even more so in life!

When we find ourselves taking strong stands against injustice and indignity in our world, it is sometimes a struggle to discern where to soften in and deepen. Moral clarity and strength of purpose are essential to resilient and just community, as we discussed in January. But also essential is the wisdom to bend when we are close to breaking, and to discern where softness could yield a greater result. Join us to explore and gain wisdom together.

# Honduras Ministry Trivia Night fundraiser scheduled Feb. 24

The Honduras Ministry's Fifth Annual Trivia Night fundraiser will be held at 5:30 p.m. Feb. 24, 2018 at UUCC to benefit our Honduras work.

The political situation in Honduras is dire. Due to strikes and political unrest, many doctors and nurses aren't working, and hospitals are closing. The health clinic in El Pital, where the UUCC Honduras Ministry offered Pap smears this past summer, is completely out of medicines and supplies even though there are still leishmaniasis cases. Recently there has been a respiratory illness affecting many people in the river valley. Funds raised at the Trivia Night will be used for clinic supplies and to support the microfinance group Adelante.

Tickets are \$20, or \$15 for students. Tickets can be bought at the door or at UUCC on Jan. 28 and Feb. 4, 11 and 18.

The event will feature child care, good food, a silent auction, 50-50 raffles, a chili cook-off, and, of course, much trivia fun! Bring chili to share by 5:45 p.m. for a chance to win a beautiful Honduran bag!

## <u>President's Perspective</u> "What is most important to you at UUCC?"

Writing this monthly article, as with many things in life, is both a blessing and a burden. The burden comes as the deadline approaches and I realize that I don't have a clue what I want to write about that is meaningful to me and, I hope, to you.

The blessing is that each month so far the pressure of the deadline makes me really look at what's going on in our church in the search for a theme. For me, and perhaps for you, much of my life in the church – and in life in general – is a matter of routine. I put one foot in front of the other and walk the well-trodden paths of life without really experiencing what is going on around me. The deadline makes me slow down and look around.

This month, my attention settled on our annual Founders' Day celebration. With a couple of notable exceptions (50th anniversary in 2001, Rev. Haney honored as minister *emeritus* in 2016), over the 19 years I have been a member of UUCC, Founders' Day has been an annual date on the church calendar that came and went without much reflection. This year is different.

This year, I realize how blessed I am that our founders made the effort to form their fellowship 67 years ago. Without their efforts, the congregation that is so much a part of my life would not exist. Columbia without a home for those of us who seek an environment in which we can pursue the very human quest for spiritual meaning without dogma would not be as rich. Our founders could not foresee the future of the modest fellowship they formed, but I am very grateful that they planted the seed that brought us all together in a community of radical welcome that seeks to help heal our world.

It is our responsibility to be good stewards of the gift they gave us. Our stewardship campaign will begin Feb. 4 and run through March 4. The theme this year is "Weaving Community Together." The highlight will be a series of small-group dinners where we can gather to share why UUCC is important to each of us. I know Cande and I came to UUCC when our children were young so they could learn the tools necessary for them to search for their purpose in an atmosphere of open inquiry. We stay because of our community, the opportunity to serve and make a difference, and to have a safe place to explore what it means to be human.

The stewardship campaign is, of course, about obtaining pledges to support the work of our congregation, from keeping the lights on to social action to youth R.E. to all of the other activities that go on at UUCC. These efforts are supported in large part by the many committed volunteers at UUCC. But they cannot do it alone. The staff, our facility, and funds to support our many initiatives are critical, and receiving commitments by pledge allows us to be good stewards of the resources you generously provide.

But this campaign and the small-dinner format provides an opportunity for deeper connection that in many ways is far more significant than a monetary commitment. A group of us gathered last Sunday to discuss the campaign. We began our meeting answering the question: What is most important to you about UUCC? Some in the meeting I've known for 19 years and others I have known for far less time. But no matter how long our acquaintance, I learned something new about each individual, and feel a deeper connection as a result. I urge you to take advantage of this opportunity. I'm sure you will find it rewarding.

On a not totally unrelated note, I took Marques up on his invitation to join the mass choir for Founders 'Day services. I haven't sung in a choir since I was a soprano, and I haven't sung in a stage chorus for more than 40 years, so I wasn't sure what to expect. Bottom line: Marques makes singing fun while making everyone a better singer. And we even sound like we know what we're doing! Amazing. If you like to sing at all, I recommend you give the choir a try. You may just find it's what you've been looking for.

At 10:30 a.m. Feb. 11, we will celebrate making and keeping those resolutions with a brief intergenerational ceremony – and cookies! All are welcome!

# <u>A Different Kind of Stewardship Campaign</u> "Weaving Together Community"

All year we're exploring the idea of "Weaving Together Community," remembering how much stronger we are together, and how much beauty we create when we weave together our lives. As we weave a beautiful and powerful future for our community, part of what we bring to the tapestry are our many gifts and resources. This month's stewardship campaign is all about weaving community *and* sharing our gifts with our beloved congregation!

Again this year our primary stewardship goal is to receive pledges from 100% of potential pledgers – we estimate there are 206. If everyone turns in a pledge, and those who are able consider a 7.5% increase, then we feel confident we can reach our total giving goal of 328,650 - a 7.4% increase over last year's giving.

#### Why Pledge?

Pledges are what enable us to plan a realistic budget. While cash donations in the offering basket are greatly appreciated, and are used to help support the church and its causes, they are unpredictable, and thus we cannot rely upon them when planning our budget.

#### Where Do Your Pledge Dollars Go?

Pledges made during the stewardship campaign constitute about 90% of church income. The remainder comes from pledges made at other times, undesignated Sunday offerings, facility rentals and fund-raisers. Your pledge dollars fund everything about our regular operating budget, from staff salaries to building maintenance and utilities to our ministry team budgets.

Increases for next year will allow us to:

• Take on an Intern Minister to share her gifts and receive training from our congregation.

• Fully fund our music program and accompaniment needs.


• Increase babysitting for families at church events and meetings.

• Fund new ministries like Adult RE, Accessibility and Inclusion Team, and Sanctuary Team, and more!

# <u>**REflections**</u>



The theme this month at UUCC is flexibility – about how we as a community can work together when we are able to be flexible and approach problems in new and creative ways. I think the first step of this always begins with deep listening. Being a parent means having opportunities to practice and model this skill all the time, as we turn away from the rigid thinking of a battle of wills and instead use flexible thinking to discover a creative solution where everyone ends up feeling good. Taking the time to work through this process with

our children helps teach them important lessons in how to live in a world with people who see things differently than them. Here are some ways to engage in the spiritual practice of flexibility:

- Come to our Valentine's Dance and explore moving with other people, leading, following, improvising, and sharing new moves.
- Play the game Obstacles, a fun card game for all ages that explores solving problems together.
- Go on a photo-taking nature walk, and try taking a photo of a single object from as many different perspectives as you can: close up, far off, sideways, and upside down.
- Do yoga together to practice literal flexibility and the ability to challenge ourselves to take unusual poses and remain calmly breathing throughout.
- Read "Anything Is Possible" by Guilia Belloni and Marco Trevison.


