Resilient Community Weaves In . . .

Memory

"Without memory there would be no civilization, no society, no future."

– Elie Weisel

There is a story by Jewish author Sandy Eisenberg Sasso in which she imagines a conversation between God and the Angels as God turns to create memory and forgetfulness. The Angels beg God not to create forgetfulness, afraid the people will not remember the songs of their ancestors and the story of their people. Yet God admonishes them that remembering is not always so pleasant, and asks them what *they* remember about all of time and the space before time. Remembering all they have seen and known, the Angels are wracked with sorrow and paralyzed by regret. They understand then, the balance of remembering and forgetting.

So God creates forgetting as a source of relief, and God creates remembrance as a seed of understanding and resilience in the souls of all humankind.

There are some things we need to forget if we are to function in this world. And yet, so much of our resilience also comes from rooting ourselves in memory – in knowing the songs of our ancestors and the stories of our people and even the narratives of our own deep selves. Without memory there is no society, no time, no us.

This month we will explore the slippery, complex landscape of memory and its importance in shaping who and how we understand ourselves to be.

President's Perspective

"How Can a Member Contribute?"

It seems like such a busy time at church right now. The YRUU Valentine's Dance was last night, the annual Honduras Ministry fund raiser is next Saturday, and the Stewardship Campaign is under way, to name just a few things going on. But, really, when isn't it a busy time at UUCC? That's life in a thriving congregation!

There are a couple of things coming up very quickly that I want to make sure you're aware of. The Nominating Committee (Kevin Fritsche, Peter Holmes, Maria Oropallo) is looking for people interested in being delegates to the UUA General Assembly in Kansas City June 20-24. Delegates are official representatives of our congregation authorized to vote on our behalf on matters brought before the General Assembly. There is money in our budget to pay the registration fees for delegates, but other expenses generally are borne by the delegates. If you are interested, please let the committee know by March 10 so that the board may name the delegates at its March 15 meeting.

You do not need to be a delegate to attend G.A. Anyone can attend, and there are many exciting workshops and worship opportunities available. For more information, see https://www.uua.org/ga.

The committee is also seeking members interested in serving on the Board of Trustees for the three positions we will elect at our spring congregational meeting. Any voting member may serve as a trustee. I personally recommend that someone be a member for at least a year before serving on the board just so you have a deeper familiarity with the congregation, but that isn't a by-law requirement. I'm serving my sec-

ond term on the Board and have found both times very rewarding. I have a much deeper understanding of the great work we are doing and all the hard work by all of you that makes it possible. The committee is asking that people interested in becoming board members contact them by March 10 so we can be sure to have enough time to include their names in the notice of the annual meeting. If you don't meet that deadline, you can still run. Nominations are allowed even at the annual meeting.

We will have completed the main portion of our stewardship campaign by the time you read this. As always, there are likely still some folks we have not yet heard from. If you are among them, please let Michela Skelton Birk (kaylamskelton@gmail.com) or Jan Swaney (jiswan56@gmail.com) know what your plans are, even if you will not be able to pledge this year. This information is important for purposes of planning for the coming church year. Thank you, and thanks to all who have already pledged. A special thanks to the Stewardship Team members for their hard and vital work.

I also want to let you know that the congregation received a nice thank you note from Sally Fritsche for our assistance in her most recent step in the process leading to ordination. I posted it on the bulletin board in the Greeting Area. Molly also indicated she received a note from Rev. Haney expressing his delight in the use of the money in the fund named in his honor for this purpose.



UUCC Stream Team Monitoring of Hinkson Creek

Join the Green Sanctuary Team's Stream Team in monitoring the health of Hinkson Creek at 1:30 p.m. Saturday, March 10. Meet at the church.

We will be catching and counting macroinvertebrates (like the mayfly shown here) that live in the creek. We will also be measuring stream flow, water temperature, dissolved oxygen, nitrate content, pH level, conductivity, and turbidity.

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A Different Kind of Stewardship Campaign

"Weaving Our Future Together"

Hello, fellow UUCC members and friends!

At the end of last week, I posted in our community Facebook group an interview with my son Theo, who is 5 years old, on what he loves about UUCC. From the mouth of babes comes some of the purest praises for our beloved community. He told us that his favorite things about coming to church were seeing Mr. Kevin (Kevin Fritsche, who regularly teaches the Potter class) and his friends in class. Most importantly he tells us that he loves everyone in the church, and he knows everyone loves him too.

I am so grateful we have such a dedicated group of volunteers who help our children grow from preschool where they learn about love, kindness, and community, through young adulthood where they learn to dismantle systems of oppression and use their voices to create a more just and loving world. Our pledges are necessary to support this great program and help develop our next generation of UUs into the leaders we will need tomorrow.

I am pleased to report that as of Feb. 20, our pledging total was \$116,213, about 35% of our goal, with a little less than two weeks of our pledge drive remaining. The percentage increase from existing pledgers is just below the 7.4 percent bump that is our goal.

With this added support we will better fund our music program, become a teaching ministry to support an intern UU Minister, provide support to the work of our



Sanctuary Team and Access and Inclusion Team, and kick off a new Adult RE program in the Fall – and more!

Our hope is that each and every one of our members and friends will join us in **Weaving Our Future Together** and make a financial pledge to help us realize our goals. It is only through the receipt of pledges that the church can plan its budget for the coming fiscal year that will begin July 1, 2018.

You can pledge by completing a pledge card and mailing it or dropping it off at the church, or you can securely submit an online pledge.

Our pledge drive closes March 4.

And I remember how much I hungered for their presence as a child. I loved to hear stories of my



non-conformist Puritan ancestors on my father's side, of my ancestors fleeing pogroms on my mother's side, and how these ancestors became a part of who I knew myself to be, how I carried their memory within me. This month, as we reflect on our

theme of memory, take some time with your children to invoke the presence of the Ancestors.

- Share stories and photographs of your family as far back as you know.
- Prepare a special dish from an old family recipe.
- Read folktales from your cultural heritage.
- Take some time to acknowledge the wrongs that people from your cultural heritage may have perpetrated. How does that shape our responsibilities to the world today?
- Acknowledge ancestors whose names you will never know, but whose existence can still be a powerful memory and source of strength. Also remember the ancestors who may not have been part of our family directly, but who still shaped our story.

New chalice dedicated



Rev. Molly lit the new chalice on Jan. 28 from a flame passed from the chalice made by Naoma Powell.

Our observance of the 67th anniversary of our church's founding at worship services on Jan. 28, 2018 included dedication of a beautiful new metal chalice purchased and given to the church by a member couple.

The late Naoma Powell made the chalice we had been using since 2006 after the congregation's previous chalice broke, and it was always intended to be temporary. Naoma's chalice served us long and well, but was showing signs of wear. To protect this beloved artifact, it is being officially "retired" from active duty but will always have a place in our sanctuary and will still be used for special occasions.

The new chalice is larger and will be easier to see from all parts of the sanctuary, in keeping with the needs of our growing congregation. It was dedicated with Naoma's own January 2006 words of dedication of the chalice now being retired:

Though chalice changes, the flame burns bright.

Not holder, not cup but flame that offers light.

Flame that lights the darkness.

Flame, in its burning, illumines night.

Flame, its double halo, bringing light to shadow, warmth to shade.

Flame, re-igniting

Constant.

Meet the chalice artist

Our new chalice that was dedicated at the Jan. 28 worship services was crafted by Ryan Schmidt, a metal artist based in Cumberland Gap, Tenn.

Ryan owned and managed a motorcycle repair shop in Kansas City before moving to Tennessee in 2015. Shortly after moving he met a neighbor, William Brock, a traditional blacksmith who taught Ryan the art of blacksmithing. Ryan's passion is creating custom-made functional objects, ornamental ironwork, sculptures, and furniture. He is a member of several professional blacksmithing groups.

When Ryan is not creating art at his shop, Mitty's Metal Art (https://www.mittysmetal-art.com/), he likes to get out and explore the surrounding Appalachian region on his Harley or mountain bike. Ryan is not a UU but is familiar with our denomination through friends.

While icy weather limited the attendance, we hope that when the accounting is completed, it will show that a significant amount was earned toward the support of anyone entering into sanctuary.

Get Grounded - Join the Grounds Team

Are you a new church member, looking for ways to connect with fellow Columbia UUs? Are you a long-time member who'd like to participate in church life in a new way, without feeling over-committed? Whoever you are, the UUCC Grounds Team may have something for you!

Our team's mission is to foster the development and maintenance of our church's grounds in an earth-friendly and sustainable way, and to encourage people of all ages to interact with the beautiful outdoor space around our church. We usually meet monthly (less often during the cold months) to develop our priorities for the year, discuss ongoing projects, and to work outdoors on planting, weeding, mulching, and whatever else needs to be done to keep our church grounds beautiful, healthy, and people-friendly.

Our biggest project over the past three years has been converting the perennial beds in the church's "front yard" to native species. This effort is almost complete, and couldn't have been accomplished without the dedication of many volunteers who contributed physical labor as well as the brain power to conceive and plan the plantings. Projects in the works include adding native plants to the Memorial Garden area and a possible collaboration with the R.E. Team to develop a natural playground area.

The Grounds Team could use a few new members to help with the visioning, planning, and budgeting part of our mission. And we can always use more helpers at our outdoor work days during the warm months. If collaborating with a fun, laid-back group of UUs who like to spend time outdoors sounds like a good way to contribute to the life of our church, the Grounds Team is for you!
