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### 2018-19 Theme Loaded Words

"Speech has power. Words do not fade. What starts out as a sound, ends in a deed." – Abraham Joshua Herschel

I believe that one of the central tasks of Unitarian Universalism is to wrestle with big ideas. We are not a people to let a thought lie, but rather we turn them upside down and around and examine every inch. We know that words and ideas have formative power in our world and that we must contest in the public sphere for language that is precise and powerful and true. To do this, we must first do our own grappling.

This year, we will be going deep each month with a "loaded word," exploring what we think we know about language we may use every day or reject out of hand. Some of these words are already complicated for us, as people with many experiences and beliefs seeking meaning together. Some of them might feel easy to us... too easy, and might be calling us to challenge our assumptions. All of them, I hope, are ripe for deeper examination.

Our loaded words this year are: Sanctuary, Evil, Sacrifice, Faith, Solidarity, Power, Salvation, Surrender, and Obligation. Join us to wrestle with them all together.



### President's Perspective Setting goals while having a little fun

The full Board of Trustees and Rev. Molly met all day Saturday, Aug. 18, for our annual retreat. It was a time for new board members to learn more about the work of the board and a time for everyone to get to know each other a bit better. The day proved to be a wonderful combination of fun (we survived a break– out room in Columbia and worked together well enough to get out of the room!), some spiritual inspiration from Rev. Molly, some goal setting for the year, some singing and, of course, we just had to enjoy some good food together.

I'm happy to share that board members were in full agreement regarding our priorities for the coming year. We still have work to do on prioritizing our goals, but it seems fair to share with you some of what's on our worksheet. First, we hope to assist the Building Needs Task Force (see interim report on page 7) in any way possible to further their work on assessing building needs. You will be hearing more directly from the task force in the coming weeks as they ask for input from some members of the congregation. Second, we felt that it was time for us to review the board policies to determine if any changes are needed. We will begin reviewing segments of our policies starting at our September meeting. Third, we're hoping to come up with some ideas and plans to encourage better linkage between the congregation and the board, including specific opportunities for members to chat informally with board members. These are not our only goals for the year, but they will certainly keep us busy in the coming months.

### UUs with Disabilities Accessibility and Inclusion Ministry Team

As with other marginalized populations, the needs and experiences of people with disabilities can be unmet or overlooked. With this in mind, the Accessibility and Inclusion Ministry (AIM) Team conducted a survey last fall to assess the current state of accessibility and inclusivity of persons with disabilities within our congregation. A total of 79 individuals, or 30% of our 264 members at the time, completed the survey, which was available online, as well as in regular and large print.

We discovered that 13% of our church identify as having at least one disability, which is a little less than the national average of about 20%. Physical and visual disabilities had the highest frequency, with mental health/ emotional as the next most common. Over 20 survey takers expressed desire for an elevator, but we learned about other needs as well. Several participants live with light or chemical sensitivity, or allergies, and experience migraines or allergic reactions at our church. Multiple individuals have difficulty hearing in the sanctuary and the greeting area. When it comes to invisible disabilities, including those relating to mental health and autism, some individuals feel supported, while others would like members to be more accepting and understanding.

While some information, like the many calls for an elevator, may be unsurprising, these results shed light on the different experiences of a significant percentage of our congregation. We invite you to learn more about disabilities and radical welcome at one of our events this year!

### Forum – September 2018

#### 9 a.m. Sundays

The UU Forum, an adult discussion group open to the public, meets on Sundays from 9 to 10 a.m. Conversation and light refreshments are offered along with the discussion. Forum coordinator: Bill Clark, 573-474-4510.

**Sept. 2:** Wayne Anderson will discuss his "Travels into Our Past, Volume Two." He will focus on several of the programs that have re-enactors, who help us on our journeys into what our world was like earlier.

**Sept. 9:** The nation's rejection of and hostility toward homosexuality is reflected in the history of the University of Missouri-Columbia. Wayne Anderson as a staff member at the Counseling Service was in a position to watch the evolution of attitudes from total rejection as students were charged with "crimes against nature" to the more modern acceptance of homosexuality as an alternate but normal form of sexuality.

**Sept. 16:** Nobel Prizes have been awarded to 892 individuals, of whom 201 or 22.5% were Jews, although the total Jewish population comprises less than **0.2%** of the world's population. Given the degree of anti-Semitism in the 20th century resulting in the Holocaust, how could this be?

**Sept. 23:** Wayne Anderson has visited a number of sites where the Native American Clovis People left artifacts telling us about their lifestyle – sites, in California, Colorado, Missouri, Florida and Ohio. Thirteen thousand years ago, giant creatures lived in Missouri. This was a world in which a normal human would have seemed diminutive. Despite their lack of size, how did they not only survive, but become the rulers of this giant domain?

**Sept. 30:** Our relationship to the Native Americans was fraught with dishonesty and deception. Wayne Anderson has visited over 70 Indian sites and museums across the country and will focus on the Cherokee to show how even a cooperating tribe that made a serious attempt to become like us was doomed to failure.

### Honduras Ministry News

The Honduras Ministry Team has been sending \$400 monthly to the health clinic in El Pital. The majority of these funds are donated by several individuals on the team in the name of our church.

We received a thank-you letter of profound gratitude from the nurse who staffs the clinic. Through our UUCC donations, the clinic has been able to provide aid to the people of eight different communities in the Cangrejal River Valley. The clinic was able to manage Leishmaniasis and flu outbreaks and remain open during the political crisis when no public agencies were functioning and the clinic was without any sort of medicines or supplies other than what they were able to purchase from our funds. Our contributions also are vital for everyday needs that we take for granted such as bandages, antibacterial ointments and asthma medications. ### 'The Struggle for Disability Rights: Yesterday and Today' 12:30 to 2 p.m. Sept. 23 in the Sanctuary

The Accessibility and Inclusion Ministry Team will sponsor a program titled "The Struggle for Disability Rights: Yesterday and Today" in the sanctuary at 12:30 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 23. The program will feature a showing of "Lives Worth Living," a 2011 documentary about the Disability Rights Movement.

The film will be followed by a discussion of how people with disabilities and their allies are still struggling for their rights today. A light lunch and childcare will be provided. The program is expected to end about 2 p.m.

The documentary is universally designed with closed captioning and audio description. Director Eric Neudel described the film as follows:

"Echoing footage of Martin Luther King marching in Selma, we see protestors climb from wheelchairs and drag themselves courageously up courthouse steps; we watch as quadriplegic activists maneuver their chairs in front of public buses that are not equipped to accommodate them.

"The film ends with the dramatic battle for the Americans with Disabilities Act, one of the most important pieces of civil rights legislation in America's history. The thousands of individuals who came together to change attitudes and laws demonstrated the power of humanity, cooperation, and self -determination, and what can be accomplished against seemingly insurmountable obstacles."

### Buildings Needs Task Force – Interim Report

(presented at the May 6, 2018 Annual Congregational Meeting)

A Building Needs Task Force (Gretchen Maune, Larry Lile, Matthew Bossaller, Connie Ordway, Kevin Fritsche) was appointed by the UUCC Board of Trustees in 2017 and charged with the following objectives:

• Discern the desires of the congregation regarding changes to and/or expansion of our current church facilities;

• Research practical solutions to meeting these desires, including the possibility of relocating or adding satellite location(s);

• Present to the Board at least three well-researched options for meeting the congregations' aspirations regarding our facilities.

What follows is a brief summary of our progress to date. Task force members welcome your questions and feedback.

### <u>Membership Growth</u>

Our membership has grown by a rate of  $\sim 6\%$  per year since 2013 (i.e., shortly after the start of Rev. Molly's ministry). We believe that it is reasonable to expect our membership to expand to nearly 350 within the next decade. Our current facility could not well-serve a congregation of that size.

#### Acute/Immediate Buildings Needs

There seems to be a consensus among our members that the installation of an elevator in the space set aside for this during the previous building expansion is a TOP PRIORITY. In addition to an elevator, there are a few other facility modifications that could improve accessibility, which would be modest in cost and should be implemented as soon as it is practical to do so. There exist several deferred maintenance items that have been pointed out to the team, but the most obvious and frequently mentioned one is the need to replace the carpeting throughout the building.

### **Top Building/Space Limitations**

Our sanctuary is often filled to capacity, despite the addition of a second Sunday morning service. An expanded sanctuary space would help accommodate projected growth in membership.

Currently, the space that serves as an entry and welcoming space (*i.e.*, "Greeting Area") is too small to accommodate the number of people that gather there on most Sundays.

At the present time we do not have suitable office space for our current staffing levels. As we grow in members, we anticipate more staff, which will only make the shortage of office space more problematic.

Meeting room space can be at a premium, particularly on Sunday afternoons. Storage space is at a premium both upstairs and downstairs.

Expansion and renovation of the upstairs kitchen to a "commercial" kitchen or the inclusion of a commercial kitchen in a new facility/expansion project would be highly desirable.

On-site parking is limited. Guidelines suggest that we should consider expanding our 43 spaces to about 60 or 70.

### **A New Year in Religious Education!**

We begin an exciting new year in religious education at UUCC. We will be using some fantastic new curricula as well as doing our wonderful Coming of Age Program for 7th and 8th graders. We have reconfigured the age groups of our classes to accommodate the Coming of Age class, adding the 5th-6th grade Adams class.
