Writing in the shadow of the Holocaust in the years after the Second World War, German-American philosopher Hannah Arendt once said, "The sad truth is that most evil is done by people who never make up their minds to be good or evil." In the days following Sept. 11, 2001, George W. Bush immediately began using intense theological language about Good and Evil. He used these categories often and with what many saw as great hubris. He called other nations evil, he spoke of Evil as a force, somehow beyond human control. He communicated an entire theology of evil that was antithetical to much of our Unitarian Universalist worldview including a human capacity for transformation, and he followed that theology straight into an unjust war.

Since those days, Evil has been a loaded word for me. And yet, grappling with good and evil feels imperative, if we are to wrestle our way toward any kind of moral clarity in a time that requires our clear actions on behalf of love. We can think about evil with humility, we can think about it with hope, but we cannot ignore it.

Join us this month to wrestle with evil, together! See you in church!

REflections

This month, as we dig into our work this year of re-examining loaded words, we tackle the theme of evil. This feels like a particularly tricky one to me as a parent. As children begin to develop a sense of morality, a common practice is to sort the world into "good guys" and "bad guys." I remember my discomfort, while I was watching yet another story of police misconduct play out in the news, observing my child play cops and robbers with his legos, building a jail for the robbers, one with no door. When I asked about this, he said the robbers were bad so they had to stay in jail forever. When I think of what I want my children to understand about evil, it is that evil is not a person but a behavior, and that any time we are choosing what behavior we want to engage in. "Good guys" can make a choice to be evil, and "bad guys" can make a choice to turn toward good.

Children need that clear black and white of right and wrong in their early development, but we can begin to lay the groundwork of exploring how each of us has the potential toward good and evil. Consider having a conversation with your child about what actions you both see as evil and why. Ultimately, that becomes a conversation about what your most core values as a family are.

In our Monster Mash Intergenerational Service on Oct. 21, we will explore this in greater depth – how we can look to make-believe and one-dimensional monsters as a tool for understanding how evil relates to our own impulses and choices.

And as they play their games of good guys and bad guys, maybe we can show them how to build a door in their jail.
