# **SACRIFICE**

"What we obtain too cheaply, we esteem too lightly; it's dearness only that gives everything its value."

- Thomas Paine

The act of creation is a deep example of this spiritual truth: the most important things in this life cost us something. Whether you have brought art or thought or handicraft or even new life into this world, you know this truth — creating costs us sleep, attention, emotional exertion, physical discomfort, or even steeper prices. And often it is just that dear cost that marks the magnitude of our creation... Our sacrifices impart value.

And yet, the idea of sacrifice is constantly complicated by dynamics of power, particularly when those with much power seek to externalize the costs of their desires. We may sacrifice for ourselves with deep joy, but we can also be sacrificed cruelly and brutally to the whims of those with greater power than us. And of course we can also sacrifice too much of ourselves even in the act of creation or love – some costs are too dear. These truths call for discernment – to whom and for whom are we sacrificing of ourselves as we move through this life?

Join us this month to explore the cost of love and creation, and to struggle with the complicated calling to sacrifice for what we hold most dear.

#### Report from Dave Gibbons

## 20 people with hope at the border

Members of the UUCC Sanctuary Congregation Team are involved in many forms of justice work on behalf of the immigrant community, and we wanted to share this report from Sanctuary Team member Dave Gibbons about what he recently experienced at the border in Texas.

Knowing Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agents would drop off any released detainees at the bus station in Brownsville, Texas in the early morning hours, Rev. Sharmin DeMoss of Southwest Good Samaritan Ministries, a ministry of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Los Fresnos, Texas, and I arrived about 6:45 a.m. and found a group of 16 people who were being assisted by volunteers from Good Neighbor Settlement House in Brownsville, a ministry of the United Methodist Church in Brownsville. They provided each person with a care package for their respective journeys to sponsors. The sponsors might be family, friends, or volunteers willing to provide them with room, board, and transportation to all checkins with immigration officials and eventually to their asylum hearings. Most of the 16 were awaiting bus transportation, and a few would be taken to the airport for flights to the locations of their respective sponsors.

There are two pedestrian bridges across the Rio Grande River connecting Brownsville and Matamoros, Mexico, and there is a group camped in Matamoros at one of the bridges waiting to enter the U.S. to seek asylum. At the bus station we learned that one of the ministries of Good Neighbor Settlement House, in addition to volunteering at the bus station, is to provide food, toys for any children, and other supplies while the people wait. Because food is only provided in the morning and evening, it was suggested we could possibly take them some midday snacks. So after a trip to the store, we walked across the bridge into Matamoros with our snacks, crayons, coloring books, and ibuprofen because of the headaches people were experiencing waiting in the heat. We found the group of asylum seekers, and while we were there, two Mexican immigration officials came and announced that four of the individuals were being allowed to enter the U.S. and begin the long process of attempting to obtain asylum. They most likely will be detained at one of the detention facilities, but while in detention they hopefully will pass their credible fear interviews and eventually be at the bus station like the 16 people we saw earlier.

So despite my anger and frustration with the immigration policies and practices of our current administration and with our broken immigration system in general, it was heartwarming to see at least these 20 people moving forward with some hope toward possible asylum.

# REflections

As we think about our theme of sacrifice this month, I am reminded of the book *The Giving Tree* by Shel Silverstein. I have found that there are two groups of thought on this book, those who love it and those who don't. From the first time I read it as a child, I fell immediately into the latter category. I thought, as a 7-year-old, that it was a poorly disguised guilt trip about how our parents give so much to us and we fail to appreciate them. As an adult, it reads like an unhealthy or even abusive relationship. I had a friend who disliked it because he felt it carried a message of human's sense of entitlement in destroying the environment.

But I have also had great conversations with those who love it, who are deeply moved by the book's messages of giving without expectations of return, unconditional love, and what it means to love unconditionally into the world.

Whichever camp you fall into, this book seems like a great place to start the conversation around the loaded word of sacrifice. What does it mean to give up something to help others? How can this be done in a way that is healthy and respectful of ourselves as well as others? How do we respond to the sacrifice of others? I have found. from my own personal experience and my experience with children, that even very young children find something meaningful in this book, about both the power and the problems of sacrifice.
