# Power

"Power without love is reckless and abusive, and love without power is sentimental and anemic. Power at its best is love implementing the demands of justice, and justice at its best is power correcting everything that stands against love" – Martin Luther King Jr.

Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King described power as "the ability to achieve purpose" and "the strength required to bring about social, political and economic change." Power is a neutral force that can be used for good or for ill, and the *way* we use it is often a strong predictor of its positive or negative influence. Power-over is used to oppress; powerwith is used to free. The two are often confused.

Some of the biggest mistakes we make in our interactions with other people come when we misjudge the amount of power we are bringing to the situation – over-estimating our power can lead to ineffectual action, and under-estimating our power can lead to great harm or injury of the other.

Power can be personal, positional, institutional, structural, ideological, collaborative, dominant, and more. In any situation, it behooves us to ask, where is my power coming from and how am I sharing it equitably? This month, let's get in right relationship to our power.

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# Stewardship 2019 – 'Speak Hope, Share Love'

As we spend the year considering "Loaded Words," we are reminded that words are how we write the poetry of our dreams and desires to make the world a more just and caring place. Words speak truth to power, speak up for those who have no voice, and declare hope in a time of division and hate – thus, this year's stewardship theme, "Speak Hope, Share Love."

The stewardship campaign from Feb. 3 to March 3 challenges each of us to speak our hopes and share the love of a community that is made more whole by our actions to realize those hopes. As in previous years, our primary goal is to receive pledges from 100% of those who consider UUCC a spiritual home – both members and friends of the congregation. Pledging is not an exercise in brinkmanship that risks your financial future, but instead asks you to live within your means to support the work of this church that plays a role in your spiritual journey and practice. Our goal is more attainable when everyone participates, and with your help we believe we can reach our \$335,000 goal – a 5% increase over last year's giving.

#### Why Pledge?

Pledges enable us to plan a realistic budget. While cash donations in the offering basket are greatly appreciated and are used to help support the church and its causes, they are unpredictable – so we rely on the pledge commitments of our community of members and friends to set our budget. Your pledge will be for our fiscal year starting July 1, 2019.

#### Where Do Your Pledge Dollars Go?

Pledges made during the stewardship campaign constitute about 90% of church income. The remainder comes from pledges made at other times, undesignated Sunday offerings, facility rentals and fund-raisers.

In the 2018-2019 fiscal year ending June 30, we have budgeted \$348,558.

For the 2019-2020 fiscal year starting July 1, we project spending needs of about \$365,000, which will allow us to:

• Enhance funding of our exciting music programming.

• More fully fund new ministries including Adult R.E., the Accessibility and Inclusion Ministry Team, the Sanctuary Team, and more.

• Meet the rising costs of health insurance for our staff.

The pie chart below shows the proportions of our projected budget that will go to worship, religious education and ministries. Each category includes associated staff, administrative and facilities expenses.





Considering Your Pledge Amount

The amount you pledge is your personal decision based on your financial resources and needs. The Stewardship Team asks that you consider the Fair Share Pledging Guide you will find on the back of this year's pledge card and online.

Most of our members are able to contribute on a regular basis, and many households already pledge at the suggested levels. For those who do not, we ask you to work toward meeting the guidelines over time. For newer members and friends, we ask that you consider pledging an amount that reflects a serious commitment to the church you have chosen as your spiritual home.

We estimate that we can meet our dollar target if current pledgers will increase their pledges by 5% to 15% and if new pledgers will pledge at least \$30 per month.

# February focus for Festival of Sharing

For the month of February, the focus is on the "Missouri Baby Bundle Pack" project. Each box will consist of the following items:

- 2 receiving blankets
- 1 sweater or sweatshirt
- 2 sleepers
- 8-12 count of disposable or cloth diapers
- 3-pack of onesies
- 4 diaper pins (if cloth diapers are enclosed)

In 2017, there were requests for 1,744 packs state-wide but only 1,435 were provided. In particular, agencies do not usually have a large supply of diapers. Collection boxes are available in the church greeting area.

# **REflections**

This month, we are exploring the meaning of the word "power" and its value to us as UUs. I think one of the most challenging aspects of childhood is a sense of powerlessness, of living in a world where adults make rules that can feel arbitrary and in which children have no voice. I encourage everyone to have conversations with their children this month about power. What is it and who has it? How do we feel when power is shared versus when power is exclusive? What is the connection between wisdom and power? (In my family, this part of the conversation has revolved around "Why can't we just eat ice cream for dinner?") Here are some other ways to explore the theme of power with your kids:

- Rewrite the family rules, giving children a role in creating them and exploring the reasons behind the rules.
- Read *Let the Children March* by Monica Clark-Robinson and discuss the Children's March in Birmingham, Ala. in 1963 to understand just how much power children can have.
- For the Harry Potter fans, the character of Dolores Umbridge is a striking example of the misuse of power, but also of how systems can create the conditions in which power can be misused. Ask your children how they feel about her character and what would need to change to make sure that type of power abuse does not happen again.
- Find out what issues concern your child, and then help find ways that allow them to use their power to be a force for change around that issue. It could be raising money for a cause they care about, donating socks to a homeless shelter, or writing a letter to a congressperson. We all have something we can do.
- When you are out hiking, look at the way different elements have power to shape the landscape. From looking at the way water shapes a rock, to the way windblown trees create new clearings in the woods, to the way a rocky outcrop shapes the curve of a path, we see how diverse and interconnected the forms of power can be.
