This winter saw my family hit by round after round of colds, ear infections, fevers and stomach bugs as our town was hit by round after round of snow, ice, and wintry mix... usually, it seemed, on a Saturday night! I am a person who loves having a plan, but this winter it seemed like every time I made a plan, it was foiled by a sick kid needing care, a germ invading my own experience, or *another* winter storm canceling worship. At some point, I just had to wave the white flag. "OK, life! I surrender! Take my plans and do what you will with me."

Every particle of my being resists surrender to all the things I cannot control. But when life keeps wresting control away from your grasp, you are forced to learn a few things about surrender. And here is one thing I learned – releasing my grip made way for creativity and even pleasure. Letting go of the workday I had planned yielded a beautiful day of baby cuddles. Letting go of the service we had planned yielded an exciting experiment in Facebook Live worship. And all of it forced me to learn my life's greatest lesson again and again and again – that life is not clay for me to mold. I am the clay, being shaped by a life that moves over and within and around and through me. What beauty can our surrender create?

### 7 p.m. Friday, April 19

A Tenebrae service is a traditional Christian service of descent into darkness held during the final three days of holy week before Easter, representing the death of Christ. It is commonly practiced with solemn music, readings from scripture, and the progressive extinguishing of candles. It recognizes that the victory of Easter morning is always preceded by the despair of Good Friday.

Contemporary progressive Christians and UUs sometimes observe Tenebrae as an opportunity to sit with the difficult realities of our world before the celebration of hope that arrives on Easter morning. Our Tenebrae service will feature contemporary readings representing all the ways people are "crucified" in this world. We will also share beautiful, solemn music, and a growing darkness. Join us.

This column is frequently used to both praise the many in our church who are passionately involved in serving our congregation and our larger community, as well as encouraging all members to become involved with an activity sponsored by the church beyond just our Sunday services. Whether you like to write, make music, garden, read books, cook food for those who are in need of a hot meal, or meet and greet others, there's an activity for you at UUCC!

On a larger scale, we also want to encourage all in the congregation to engage in our long-term goals and mission. This happens in multiple ways, with one certainly being giving as generously as possible during our annual stewardship campaign. It is only through these annual pledges that we can continue to offer the kinds of programming that sustain our membership and encourages others to join us. Another large-scale participation that is important is attending our full congregational meetings, especially our upcoming annual meeting that will be held on May 5. This meeting will focus on passing our annual budget and voting on new board members, and it will also feature an important presentation from SOA, the architectural firm we have hired to assist us with renovations in the church.

SOA will take a portion of the meeting to guide us through some fact-finding and solicit feedback from the entire congregation in order to develop a prioritized needs list. I can assure you that an elevator is absolutely already on this needs list, but we need to prioritize other items as well. ## On April 2, 9 and 16, Rev. Molly will facilitate discussion of *Emergent Strategy* by Adrienne Maree Brown.

Inspired by Octavia Butler's explorations of our human relationship to change, *Emergent Strategy* is radical self-help, society-help, and planet-help designed to shape the futures we want to live. Change is constant. The world is in a continual state of flux. It is a stream of ever-mutating, emergent patterns. Rather than steel ourselves against such change, this book invites us to feel, map, assess and learn from the swirling patterns around us in order to better understand and influence them as they happen. This is a resolutely materialist "spirituality" based equally on science and science fiction, a visionary incantation to transform that which ultimately transforms us.

Adrienne Maree Brown, co-editor of Octavia's Brood: Science Fiction from Social Justice Movements, is a social justice facilitator, healer and doula living in Detroit.

On April 23, 30 and May 7, Melissa Ensign-Bedford will lead a discussion of the national UUA Common Read selection, *Justice on Earth: People of Faith Working at the Intersections of Race, Class, and Environment*, edited by Manish Mishra-Marzetti and Jennifer Nordstrom (Skinner House Books, 2018).

At a time when racial justice, environmental justice, and economic justice are seen as issues competing for time, attention, and resources, *Justice on Earth* explores the ways in which the three are intertwined. Those on the margins are invariably those most affected by climate disaster and environmental toxins. The book asks us to recognize that our faith calls us to long-haul work for justice for our human kin, for the Earth and for all life. It invites us to look at our current challenges through a variety of different perspectives, offers tools to equip us for sustained engagement, and proposes multiple pathways for follow-up action.

### Green Sanctuary Team happenings

In April, GS Team members will be bringing a bit of nature into the sanctuary each Sunday to remind us all that we are part of an interconnected web of life that includes flowering plants, which bring us joy and beauty. Take a moment to notice the gifts of nature! Please join us for our annual service on April 28 to consider our place in that web.

We continue our partnership with the Missouri Rural Crisis Center (MRCC) to try to protect water and air in Missouri. Large confinement animal operations from Iowa and Illinois are looking to move to Missouri, having polluted the groundwater and created problems with disease and antibiotic resistance there. The only tool Missouri's rural residents have to minimize these impacts is the county-level health ordinances adopted by about 20 counties in Missouri. Unfortunately, the legislature is moving to make those self-determined protections illegal. If you are interested in protecting water and air in Missouri, or are interested in animal welfare issues, or in the quality of life of our rural neighbors, check out the GS bulletin board for more information.

Some of us participated in a Lobby Day at the capitol last month. There is another scheduled April 29, and we would welcome other UU participants! You can also help by donating to the Faith-to-Action collection benefiting MRCC at the April 28 service.

### **April focus for Festival of Sharing**

For the month of April, our Festival of Sharing focus is on the "Missouri Youth Personal Care Pack" project. These packs are for youth ages 12-18 who have experienced a crisis situation and who have been placed in state care or are experiencing homelessness. Items will be placed in drawstring bags that will be provided by the Festival of Sharing Team. The packs will contain:

- 1 chapstick
- 1 bottle hand sanitizer (3 oz)
- 1 washcloth
- 1 toothbrush and 1 travel-size toothpaste
- 1 box medicated facial cleansing pads (such as Stridex)
- 1 men's body spray or 1 small package of feminine pads
- 1 travel size shampoo and 1 travel size conditioner
- 1 deodorant
- 1 travel size lotion
- 1 comb or brush
- 3 ink pens
- 1 journal
- 1 fleece throw

In 2018, there were requests for 200 care packs statewide, but only 184 were provided. Collection boxes are available in the church greeting area.

### Honduras Ministry Trivia Night a success; next Honduras service trip in 2020

The Honduras Ministry put on its annual Trivia Night on Feb. 23. More than \$3,400 was raised, and the community of the Rio Cangrejal River Valley in Honduras sends their profound thanks and gratitude. We have sent a onetime payment of \$230 for the repair of the clinic roof. We will continue sending \$400 a month for clinic supplies (mostly paid by individual group members and supplemented by our Honduras Reserve funds.)

In addition, we are sending our annual contribution to Adelante Foundation, a Honduran microfinance organization.

The next UUCC Honduras service trip is planned for 2020. We are considering doing the trip in March 2020. Please contact Allie if you are interested and would like to know more.

What could be more terrifying?

And yet, what could be more exciting and beautiful? Some of our most joyful moments with our kids are those moments when we let go of how we think things should be and embrace the spontaneous, the ridiculous, the unique ways our children create their unfolding lives. Here are a few ways can we embrace an attitude of surrender with our families:

- Go for a bike ride, a drive or a hike where you allow the children to choose which turns to take and see where it takes you.
- Get messy together! Play in a mud puddle or do a messy art project.
- Randomly select ingredients at the grocery store together, and invent a recipe.
