- 4 folders with pockets
- 1 12-inch ruler
- 1 pair of child-sized metal scissors
- 1 large eraser
- 1 box of 24 crayons
- 1 box of 10 markers (only 10)
- 2 ink pens, medium point

FAQ's about the FTA program

"*I've heard the FTA application is a hassle to fill out.*" – You have to compile some basic contact information about the organization you are nominating. You also have to state briefly what the organization does, and why UUs should support it. It is not difficult at all. Click the purple button near the top of our website home page for the nomination form.

"My organization/program has received funding in the past via the FTA collections. Can't you just slot me in, without an application?" – For the sake of transparency in our financial dealings, we are requesting that all applicants and applications go through the same process.

"What if I miss the July 15 application deadline? Should I just forget it for this year?" – No. All available slots may not be filled by July 15. Priority will be given to nominations received by July 15, but we will consider nominations until all slots are filled.

Funding asylum seekers with a Honduran lunch on Aug. 11

The Sanctuary Team is continuing to coordinate support for Edler and his family. Recently wife Yadira and second daughter Alejandra arrived from Honduras as well, so now all four family members are reunited and living together in a duplex. Thank

you to the many generous people who donated items to fill their empty home. It is now almost complete. A few things they could still use are an oscillating fan, doormat, big pots and big mixing bowls (to be able to make tamales for sale), umbrellas, and consumables like toilet paper. If anyone is available to give rides, those would be very welcome as well. Yadira will be selling Honduran meals and giving Spanish lessons. Contact Dottie or Allie for more information.

Periodic fundraisers are planned to support asylum-seeking families with legal and other costs, and on July 10 there will be a Panera fundraiser. Be on the lookout for flyers.

Please mark your calendars for our next after-church lunch fundraiser featuring Honduran food and tamales on Aug. 11. You will have a chance to meet Edler and family, taste Yadira's great cooking, and learn more about the situation in Honduras and in our own country regarding immigrants and refugees.

A standing invitation from the UUCC Social Action Team

We invite all church members and all friends who have an interest in social justice issues to join our Social Action Team to help us shape and strengthen our work. There are five important aspects of UUCC's social justice work:

1. **Direct Service** (*e.g.* Loaves and Fishes, Room at the Inn)

2. **Fundraising** (*e.g.* through Faith-to-Action, fundraisers such as the Honduras Trivia Night, sales of artisan crafts, etc. to support social justice work)

3. Education (learning about systems of injustice, our role in them, and how to effect systemic change)

4. Advocacy and Witness (*e.g.* work with Race Matters, Friends, showing up at City Council, Solidarity Network events, working with Missouri Faith Voices, the Sanctuary Team, letters to congressional representatives, work with MADP, the Center Project, etc.)

5. Community Building and Deep Connection (to sustain ourselves in the work, but also to create the world we want to see)

Beyond joining SAT, please consider participation in any of our subcommittees or other teams such as the Anti-Racism Subcommittee, Economic Justice Subcommittee, Honduras Team, Sanctuary Team, the Missouri Faith Voices work, or the Green Sanctuary Team. Together we create the change we want to see while being who we want to be in the world.



Fragrance sensitivity? We've got you (or at least your chair) covered!

On Sunday, March 24, the Accessibility and Inclusion Ministry (AIM) Team presented the lay-led service, "Living Up to Radical Welcome," and made a small change in the sanctuary while we were at it. As we've heard a number of questions about this change, we thought it was about time we shed some light on it.

If you've been to services during the past couple of months, you have likely noticed a section of chairs in the back of the sanctuary topped with yellow pillowcases. This sunny addition was inspired by feedback we'd received from congregants who have fragrance and chemical sensitivities. These individuals had been unable to enjoy services because of the migraines, allergies, and other reactions caused by these products, which many of us don't think twice about applying. While we can't control what products each person uses before joining us for worship, we can create a space in which people who live with sensitivities or allergies to those products can, hopefully, be more comfortable and feel more radically welcome.

The AIM Team requests that the fragrance-free seating area be reserved for individuals who are not wearing perfumes or scented products. We thank you for your help with this step towards being more accessible to and inclusive of all members and guests.

REflections

This summer our UUCC community is focusing on exploring the sacred practice of reading – not just sacred texts, but finding the sacredness in secular books as well. I think the books that often hold the most sacred meaning for us, that help us form our values and our vision of what the world is and what it could be, are the books we read in childhood. So take some time this summer to find sacredness in books with your children. Here are some ways to try this out:

- Share your own cherished book with childhood with your child.
- Listen to the podcast "Harry Potter and the Sacred Text" with your child to learn sacred practices that can be applied to secular books.
- "Bless" characters in books together, sending good wishes and appreciation for people going through similar circumstances, or with similar gifts and flaws, including ourselves.
- Treat whatever book your child is reading, no matter how nonweighty in might seem, with reverence and seriousness. Find out what about that book speaks to your child.
- Talk about both what we love about books and what ways they are problematic (this comes up a lot when you are sharing favorite books from childhood!). Teach your child that they can love something while also questioning it and recognizing its flaws.
