<u>President's Perspective</u> Summer tasks and summer beauty

As part of the business conducted at the Annual Congregational Meeting in May, our congregation voted to elect three new board members. In July, their three-year terms began, and we welcomed Jeremy Duke, Rebecca Graves and Michela Skelton Birk to the Board of Trustees. I'm most thankful for their service to our community and look forward to working together. At our most recent board meeting, Jeremy was elected Treasurer, and Michela was elected President-Elect. Sam Buffaloe, whose term expires in June 2020, was re-elected Secretary.

During the summer transition period, the board members spend time learning about or reflecting on our policy governance model and our board member job description. While policy governance is certainly not new to UUCC, having been adopted in 2010-2011, it may be a new or unfamiliar governance model to some. It is important that we all have a clear understanding of how our church functions, so that together we can best carry out our mission. Policy governance emphasizes the <u>mission</u> and values of our church, as discerned by the congregation. In our work, a <u>policy</u> is an expression of the board's vision. The board leads the church by focusing on <u>ends</u> <u>statements</u> and large issues. The board delegates to the minister, staff and volunteers the job of effectively determining and executing the means by which to accomplish the ends, within the bounds of the policies. The board is continually evaluating whether the means and ends are being accomplished and, in so doing, assessing the ministry of our church.

I encourage you to learn more about our church governance at our website. There you can also find board meeting agendas and minutes, which will help you stay informed and up-to-date on board activity. The Board of Trustees is dedicated to the work of our church. We embrace and strive to represent the diversity of our beloved community. With that in mind, please reach out to your elected board members. We'd enjoy hearing from you and want to ensure that we are best representing our congregation.

As the hot summer days give way to hot fall days, I hope that you've found this summer to be a time of renewal and growth. August, for me, marks the temporary return of the monarch butterflies to our garden. Each year, I wait in eager anticipation of the first sighting, as their migratory route brings them through Missouri on their way to Mexico. I'm in awe of their beauty and inspired by their tenacity. - 1 pair of blunt metal scissors (rounded tip)
- 1 30 cm (12-inch) ruler
- 1 hand-held pencil sharpener (remove packaging)
- 1 large eraser (no pencil-cap erasers, please)
- 1 box of 24-count crayons

• 3 70-page spiral notebooks totaling 210 pages (no loose-leaf or filler paper, please)

• 1 12"x14" to 14"x17" finished size cotton or lightweight canvas bag with cloth handles (no bags with logos, please)

2,659 of these kits were shared in 2018. Collection boxes are available in the church Greeting Area.

I want to tell you about my summer vacation! This year, my family attended the Midwest Unitarian Universalist Summer Assembly (MUUSA) for the first time, and it was such an incredible experience that I want to invite all of you to think about going next year.

MUUSA is a weeklong summer camp for UUs of all ages and from all over the Midwest, set at Trout Lodge, a YMCA property on Trout Lake in Potosi, Missouri. My family stayed in a lovely (and air-conditioned!) cabin, though there are also rooms in the lodge. All meals were served in a cafeteria, with unlimited pie.

Kids attend a day camp, divided by age, with lots of fun activities – sports, water play, arts, etc. – with wonderful counselors. The program was very accommodating of special needs, which meant a lot to my family. There was also nursery care for younger children.

For adults, there were lots of workshops, from contra dancing to tai chi to photography to learning about classism to beer tasting. I attended some, but spent plenty of time relaxing, reading, swimming and boating in the lake, and meeting other UUs from around the region. There were also morning and evening worship services you could attend to center youself in this beautiful place.
