Minister's June message

In a 2019 interview for the UU LGBTQ history project, the Rev. Kim Crawford Harvie remembered her ministry among the LGBTQ Unitarian Universalist community at the height of the AIDS epidemic, when another invisible and deadly virus tore its way through a community, was treated with criminal negligence by the powers that be, and changed everything about what it meant to be human in the world.

In reflecting on this time, Rev. Harvie remembered the words of a gay man named Paul Richards, to whom she ministered as he died of AIDS. Even as his body failed him, he told her: ""In all this madness, even if it kills every single one of us and there's no one left to tell the stories, it matters that we love each other well." Last week, I read these words in a reflection by another UU minister, Rev. Manish Mishra-Marzetti, and I was stopped dead in my tracks. "Even if it kills every single one of us and there's no one left to tell the stories, it matters that we love each other well."

Viruses are merciless in taking advantage of human intimacy. And yet it matters, to the utmost, that we love each other well. And so, in a time of epidemic, love and fear do a close and clumsy dance.

We have reached the era in this epidemic where we settle in for the long haul. We are realizing that this dance will be a long one, and the right steps are not as clear as we would hope. Can I visit my parents, if we've all been careful for months? Can I hug a friend who suffered a loss, if we're both wearing masks? Am I endangering people I love? Am I in danger? The questions are excruciating and compounded by the unjust systems that make everything more impos-

President's Perspective June 7 UUCC Annual Meeting

At 1 p.m. Sunday, June 7, we will hold our yearly church meeting. We will meet virtually using the Zoom meeting platform. This offers a more collaborative space for our meeting than does the Zoom webinar platform that we're currently using for worship services.

In the Zoom meeting, we will be able to share our video and audio (both through phone and computer/ tablet). This will provide functionality to ask questions and discuss with one another in real time. As dictated by state statutes, written ballots will be distributed for voting after the meeting.

Agenda items will include election of new board members and approval of the annual budget. There will be a slate of five nominees to fill the vacant and expiring board positions, including one one-year term, one two-year term and three three-year terms.

The board has worked closely with Rev. Molly in the preparation of a conservative budget for the upcoming fiscal year. As we expect a decrease in pledge income due to COVID-19 related circumstances, the budget is balanced by thoughtful cuts to the accrual, board-directed and professional expense lines and draws on the surplus reserve fund. We did secure a Small Business Association (SBA) Paycheck Protection Program loan. This funding will be used to meet payroll needs.

Information about the board nominees and the budget details is available on the church website.

As we look to summer, I want to welcome our Philosopher-in-Residence, Rev. Dr. C.W. Dawson. I look forward to a vibrant season of learning and growth under the leadership of Rev. Molly, Rev. Dr. Dawson and our lay Worship Associates. I want to give a special thanks to Sam Buffaloe, Gretchen Maune and Barbara Rupp as their board terms come to an end this month. I look forward to connecting with the five new board members. Together we will continue the important work of realizing our shared vision through thoughtful policy making, resource allocation and program evaluation. We will continue to carefully consider our work and evaluate the impact that it will have on UUCC both now, in the uncertain times of COVID-19, and in the future. There is much to contemplate. How has the experience of pandemic disease impacted our community? How do we *now* view our mission and vision? What does church life look like in the coming months and beyond?

Notice of Annual Congregational Meeting 1 p.m. Sunday, June 7, 2020

The Board of Trustees has scheduled the Annual Congregational Meeting online via Zoom or via telephone at 1 p.m. on Sunday, June 7, 2020. Business to be conducted at the meeting is as follows:

1. Approval of the proposed 2020 218 operating budget.

2. Election of Board of Trustees members.

3. Presentation of reports.

Written ballots will be mailed out following the meeting. For the election to be considered valid under state law, the number of votes cast must equal or exceed the quorum requirement for the meeting, which is 51 voting members. A majority vote will be required to approve each matter voted upon. Members will be informed of the voting results by email as soon as possible after the votes have been counted.

Dr. Dawson holds a Ph.D. in philosophy with specialization in social and political philosophy, ethics, and philosophy of race (African American secular and religious thought). He has published articles, facilitated discussions, and lectured on race and racism in various venues including here at UUCC. Dr. Dawson is excited to be working with us this summer.

Black humanists understand humanism as a process, an existential process by which one finds and lives his/her humanity. To be human is to direct one's own life; therefore, Black Humanism calls for a seizure of decision making and implementation for oneself. Gaining power is an essential element of humanism. Some of the questions we will ponder will include: Is human autonomy possible in the modern world? How are freedom and evil related? What is the relationship of faith and reason? sible. Our answers will not all be the same.

As Unitarian Universalists, we are clear that following the best wisdom of science and protecting life is a big part of loving each other well. And, as Unitarian Universalists, we know that our interconnection will always unfold in ways we cannot predict. In the end, even our best efforts to mitigate risk cannot give us absolute control. Instead, we must live our lives in each moment, each next step, without clear answers, but centered on the question: "What does it mean to love well, in this moment?" Though starkly visible now, this has always been true. And Unitarian Universalists have always been a people who live the questions.

As we continue to reimagine our ministries for a time of physical distance, our congregation will also be living this question. What does it mean right now to love each other well? To protect one another and to reach out? How can we practice radical welcome and deep connection in new and hopeful ways? What does it mean to embody courageous love and to also do our part for the healing of the world?

There is no one with whom I'd rather live these questions, or do this close and awkward dance.

I miss you. I love you. And still, I'll see you (online) in church.

Loaves and Fishes and the pandemic

Our regular third Sunday meal at Loaves and Fishes on May 17 was, again, modified by the need to maintain safe social distancing. This time, we had signups for bringing complete boxed meals. The congregation responded, and all slots were filled. Thank you! Currently, the City of Columbia is providing trained staff to manage food distribution for Loaves and Fishes.

As of this writing, it is unclear what the situation will be for the next Loaves and Fishes meal, which will be June 21. The Social Action Team will discuss this and make a decision on our procedures at our regular monthly meeting in June. Anyone is welcome to provide input, regardless of whether or not you are on the team. But, please consider joining the Social Action Team!

Faith-to-Action goes virtual

In May we resumed Faith-to-Action collections using PayPal during Zoom services as well as accepting mail-in checks. The collections have been successful so far – yay! Thank you for your generosity.

Faith-to-Action nominations for 2020-2021 church season are open

The Social Action Team welcomes your nominations for Faith-to-Action collections starting with September 2020. You may submit a nomination online or in writing. Please submit nominations no later than July 15. Nominations received after this date will be considered if openings are still available. As of this writing, we have received only one nomination – for CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates).

Festival of Sharing June 2020

We are restarting the Festival of Sharing by repeating the call for Missouri Family Food Boxes. These are targeted for families with low incomes. We are asking for this project a second time this year because of the coronavirus-driven need for food. Each box will consist of the following items:

- 3 different cans of vegetables
- 3 different cans of fruit
- 3 cans of chicken
- 3 cans of tuna
- 1 can of pasta sauce
- 1 lb pasta (any type)
- 3 packages macaroni and cheese
- 1 jar of peanut butter

There is a great need for the food boxes. In 2019 there were requests for 6,953, but only 2,119 were provided. Your generosity allowed UUCC to provide 11 boxes. Collection boxes are available in the church greeting area.

Honduras Ministry update

Honduras, like most countries around the world, is affected by the pandemic and is under stay-at-home type orders. But Cito and Keyla, our partners with the latrine work, are staying very busy. They are continuing their education to become teachers. Thanks to UUCC donations, they have finally been able to buy a computer - now even more critically important than before the pandemic. In addition, Keyla is working with the elementary school children of the village to make sure they keep busy with worksheets and other educational materials. Both Cito and Keyla are part of a volunteer brigade to screen all people wanting to enter the river valley to make sure they aren't likely to have COVID-19 and to disinfect all cars coming into the river valley. So far their river valley has not had a single COVID-19 case, and they are working hard to keep it that way. Cito's sister Jenny has been busy making masks, though fabric is hard to come by.

The UUCC Honduras Ministry continues to send \$400 monthly to the health clinic and continues to support the microfinance group Adelante with a yearly financial donation. We are very fortunate that we were able to send a Honduras Team delegation to Honduras in December/January before the pandemic closed down such travel for the foreseeable future

Sanctuary/Immigrant Justice Team (SIJT) news

The Faith Voices of Columbia Immigrant Justice Team drafted and sent an open letter to Sheriff Carey, local law enforcement and public health officials seeking more information on how they are ensuring the health and safety of both incarcerated individuals and staff at the Boone County Jail during the time of the current pandemic. Over 150 signatures were collected, with the UUCC SIJT, the Social Action Team and many other individual UUCC members signing on as well. The SIJT is particularly concerned about undocumented migrant individuals who have not committed any crimes and are not a threat to society but are kept in the jail. Sheriff Carey had not responded at press time.

SIJT is continuing to help support the local asylum-seeking Honduran family. The pandemic has hit the family hard.
