This celebratory time of year can be painful for we who suffer grief, loss, family conflict, depression and more. Join us on Zoom for a service that takes seriously the blues that exist amid the merriment.

Christmas Eve Services - 6:30 and 8 p.m. Friday, Dec. 24

See the service descriptions for differing Covid-19 singing precautions. Vaccinations are strongly encouraged for all those eligible. Masks will be required.

We will reserve a small number of seats for visitors. Please register as early as possible. If registration exceeds available seats, we will attempt to add another service.

An outdoor cookie reception and carol sing will be offered between the two services. Your cookie contributions will be gratefully accepted.

Family Service – in person – 6:30 p.m.

This service will feature traditional carols, candlelight and an interactive telling of the Christmas story with an accessible message of hope.

This will be our soloist/ensemble-only service, with no congregational singing. At the end of the service, we will take our candles outside to sing "Silent Night" – masks will be required.

Candlelight Service – in person and online – 8 p.m.

This in-person and live-streamed service will include traditional carols, candlelight and a Christmas homily from Rev. Molly. Masked congregational singing of Christmas carols will be allowed.

Greeting for service is fun, informative, community-building and appreciated.

Time commitment: 10 to 11:30 a.m. or noon Sunday **Responsibilities:**

- Smile and greet.
- Encourage name tags. Masks will be required for all participants above age 2. Watch for new faces or people who are glancing around the room. Escort visitors with children to RE.
- Afterward, seek out the new visitors and touch base with them. Answer questions as best as you can. Refer the question to the right person, send the question to the membership team, and/or refer the person to the UUCC website.

- Once you have signed up, a more detailed instruction sheet will be provided.

The Membership Team hopes to have a board welcomer and two greeters for each service.

Usher and teller volunteers needed

With in-person worship resuming, volunteers are needed to serve as ushers and collection tellers.

About four years ago we started scheduling ushers and tellers once a month, with substitutes when scheduled ushers and tellers are not available. The system has been on hiatus while we worshiped online, but it worked well for in-person worship, and we plan to continue it. Here is a brief description of what ushers and tellers do:

- Ushers distribute and collect hymnals, welcome folks to the worship service, hand out the Order of Service, circulate collection plates, count those in attendance, and assist in other worship tasks.
- **Tellers** are responsible for counting and securing the Sunday collections, which takes about 10-15 minutes after the end of the 10:30 a.m. worship service.

Those needing help should contact the team in a time of need.



We love our trees at the UU Church of Columbia!

The Grounds Team would like to introduce you to some of our trees and invite you to share your love of our trees and woods on the UUCC Facebook page.

Shingle Oak – Wood from this oak can be split into thin sheets, which used to be made into shingles.

White Oak – These oaks can live for more than 300 years and are found throughout Missouri.

Shagbark Hickory – Its wood makes excellent, slow-burning charcoal, its nuts are edible, and its wood is used for many implements. Wildlife from moths to squirrels to bats appreciate shagbarks, too!

Sweet Gum – The star-shaped leaves of sweet gum become even more striking in the autumn, when they turn various shades of gold, red, pink, and purple, often on the same tree – sometimes even on the same leaf!

Ginkgo – A non-native tree, the ginkgo's combination of resistance to disease, insect-resistant wood, and the ability to form aerial roots and sprouts makes it durable, with some specimens claimed to be more than 2,500 years old.

How to text a donation from your smartphone

Send your text to 573-405-1202

Hint: Save this number in your phone's contacts under "UUCC Giving" to make it easy to start a text to the correct number.

The first time you use the text donation system, you will need to enter your credit/debit card information or bank ACH transfer details. You can change your payment method later by texting update.

You will have these three choices for the purpose of your donation:

Pledge Payment Sunday Collection Faith-to-Action Collection

Follow these guidelines for making your text donation:

- You can text the word **give**, and the system will then ask for the amount -or you can skip this step and enter the amount using the following guidelines.
- The amount goes first, with or without a dollar sign \$50 and 50 both will work.
- If you enter only an amount, your donation will go to the general Sunday collection.
- If you want, you can specify that result by entering a space after the amount followed by the word sunday (not capitalized). Example: **50 sunday**.
- If you want to make a pledge payment, enter a space after the dollar amount and then the word pledge. Example: **50 pledge**.
- If you want to make a Faith-to-Action donation, enter a space after the amount and the code f2a. Example: 50 f2a.

Here are some additional text codes you can use:

- **update** will allow you to change your payment method
- **refund** will result in refunding the most recent donation made if done within 24 hours if the donation started a recurring gift, the recurrence also will be canceled

If you want to set up an automatic recurring donation, use these codes:

- weekly sets up a recurring gift each week example: 50 pledge weekly
- biweekly sets up a biweekly recurring gift example: 50 fta biweekly
- monthly sets up a monthly recurring gift example: 50 sunday monthly

country are struggling with a lack of volunteerism since returning to in-person services. I got to thinking about it: While we certainly have days where we need to scramble to find a volunteer or two, overall we have had wonderful and enthusiastic volunteering in our religious education program. I actually went and counted – since we returned to in-person in late September, we have had 40 different people volunteer with our children and youth.

This semester, our R.E. lessons have been focusing on learning about the importance of community while at the same time doing the actual work of rebuilding and strengthening ours. And what I see so clearly is that beyond any lesson I put together, what our kids are learning most about community is seeing the way you show up for them. Years from now, somewhere deep in their memories and woven into the fabric their being, they will remember a loving adult who played with blocks with them, who read them a story, who chatted with them about their favorite book, who shared their love of Star Trek with them. Not because they had to, but because they loved being a part of a community.

We believe that these amazing young people have an essential role to play in helping to heal the world and create the beloved community we all dream of. You are teaching them through your work in our church what it means to love bigger than the walls of our individual family, to show up for each other and give of ourselves. What a beautiful and important shared ministry we have together in our religious education program! What amazing, loving, and uniquely gifted people am I blessed to share it with!
