Dear Ones, we have reached a new program year in the life of the church! Who knows what the future will bring, but this feels to me like a year of rooting down and stretching our wings after two and a half years of closing in and re-emerging. I feel us at the edge of a new era of our ministry together – one with new opportunities for hybridity in-person and online, excellent music, deep connection across the lifespan, and a further deepening of our commitment to anti-oppression as we live our newly adopted 8th Principle.

All of this, I believe, must be powerfully supported by grounded, rooted spirits. That's why this year your staff is particularly focusing on Spiritual Practice. You'll notice recurring practices and centering songs in our worship, home spirituality kits to check out and take home with you, opportunities to connect in spiritual practice with our church grounds, adult education offerings, and more. This is the year we root back down deeply into our own spirits, into our patch of earth, and into our shared community.


