## October's Worship Theme is "Grounding"

"Walk as if you are kissing the earth with your feet." – Thich Nhat Hanh

I was grateful to spend the last weekend with my family of origin staying at the home of my brother, who is doing very well at the moment! Thank you for all your healing wishes and love to my family.

One morning during my visit, I woke up before everyone and went out to spend some time in his lovely yard before it got (very) hot for the day. I found a spot in the shade where it appeared nothing would grow, and a lovely covering of dirt lay like the finest of sand, bare and soft. I couldn't wait to put my feet in that spot and hopped down from the porch into a puff of rising dust.

It was Oklahoma red dirt – the kind of soil that looks right to me in all the world – and I spent ten minutes just pacing about that soft bare patch, feeling the red dirt coat my feet like powdered silk and watching precise footprints deepen into the ground. It felt like my feet were indeed kissing the earth, and that the earth, too, kissed back – like a paper-y grandmother's peck on the cheek, like a blessing, like home.

When I returned to my life in Columbia, I felt centered and strong, grounded in the love of family and nurtured by the soil of home, and ready to take on whatever these uprooting times could throw at me. At least for a while.

Where do you feel the most grounded and centered in yourself? I hope we can create a space of rich nurturing soil together at UUCC this month!

## **Construction update**

Thank you to all who helped move furniture on Sunday, Sept. 18, and to all who have contributed to our Accessibility Project in any way over the last 11 months.

I am overjoyed to tell you the project is under way! We will be out of the Sanctuary Sunday, Oct. 2 with an All Ages services outdoors in back of the church. Our rain location will be Shepard Park. Online worship will be at the usual time, but may be prerecorded due to technical problems issues of outdoor streaming. Nursery care will be provided indoors, and folks may use the bathroom and other facilities on the lower level. Meditation Group, Forum and the OWL class will continue in their usual locations. Our Liberation Conversation about Reproductive Justice in Missouri will be held in the Centering Room, or possibly outdoors if attendance is extremely high.

We'll keep you posted as the work eventually moves downstairs and then focuses in on the structural changes to allow for the installation of the elevator.

#### Oct. 2 – Introducing George Grimm-Howell, Intern Minister for 2022-23.

George is a seminary student who holds a master of divinity degree from United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities. He lives in University City, MO. with his family and is a long-time member of First Unitarian Church of St. Louis. His particular interests are social justice and liberation – particularly for members of the LGBTQ+ community and people of color – and incorporating socially transformative art forms into the worship experience.

This year, as we try to navigate our way after all the changes and disruptions of the past few years, we are particularly focusing on spiritual practice as a way to help ground, center and renew our spirits. We need this as adults, but children, living increasingly busy lives, need this as well. Each month we will explore a single spiritual practice during our centering time in church, and we encourage you to continue practicing them at home as a family.

For the month of October, we will be exploring the theme of grounding. What would a grounding practice look like for you and your children? Perhaps it is as simple as putting bare feet on the ground for a few moments, and feeling that connection to the earth. Or maybe it is

lying on the ground, watching the clouds go by, feeling the earth hold you. A spiritual practice doesn't have to be complicated or formal. It is more about taking a moment of intention together. And it is a wonderful gift to teach our children how to find these moments through the hustle and bustle of life.

Another way you can explore spiritual practice this year is by checking out our home spiritual practice boxes in the Greeting Area. These kits can be taken home, and they provide multiple ways for people of all ages to

engage with a particular spiritual practice. There are meditations, visualizations, creativity practices, nature practices, and movement practices. I encourage you to experiment and find what connects with your soul and renews your spirit!
